## Women's Place owns a home

Haltom Women's Place should be able to take over the former police station today, with regional council approval. Regional Administration and Finance Committee recommended last week the old home of 48 Hugh St. be leased to Haltom Women's Place for \$1 per year with an option to purchase.

If this passes council, the members of the Women's Place would become responsible for all repairs and alterations and all operating costs as well. Regional staff estimate the home and two building lots on Hugh St. are worth \$75,000 by today's standards.

Milton Mayor Don Gordon, said he was happy the old police station would be turned over, but suggested the region could help out and clean up the old home before handing it over.

"I took a tour through there and it's in an awful mess," he said.

There was some question about the possibility of Haltom Women's Place subdividing the current lot and selling part of it at a profit.

Committee was informed the group plans to use the land to expand the current building to house more women sometime in the future.

## Funding feeling mixed

There is mixed feeling among regional councillors about supporting a type of United Appeal for Haltom.

Regional councillors have been asked to take a report on funding social service agencies back to their respective municipalities and have comments at the municipal level back to the region by Nov. 27.

While health and social services chairman Walter Mulkevich said the comments sought are not aimed at helping to decide if Haltom needs its own United Appeal, most councillors at last week's regular region meeting thought that was the intent, and said so.

Milton Mayor Don Gordon told councillors Milton "fully supports the United Way concept... and we made a motion before the full council to that effect at this week's meeting."

He said Milton does not object to helping pay its share into a funding scheme where need exists across the region, but he does not support the idea of Milton funds going to strictly local service in another municipality.

Haltom Hills Mayor Peter Pomeroy said he did not think his council was in favor of a United Appeal concept.

Mr. Mulkevich said United Appeals or United Ways are not the objective of the comments being sought.

The region wants to identify the number of agencies requesting financial help, with the view of regionalizing the fund procedure.

## Hunting prohibited

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority issued a reminder this week that hunting and trapping is forbidden in its conservation areas under Ontario Regulation 580/77.

\* Now every week for every 3 million tickets issued there are:

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Now there's a new Wintario ticket with a 6-digit number and no series number. \*\* It's a lot simpler - and a lot more fun to play.

You win \$100 if any three consecutive digits of your ticket number match the 3-digit number drawn. For instance, say your ticket number is 123456. You could win if 123, 234, 345, or 456 were drawn. Four ways to play your ticket number!

In the same way, you could win \$100 by matching any four consecutive digits of your ticket number with the winning 4-digit number drawn. Match the 5-digit winning number and win \$1,000.
