



Doug Gamsby. representing developer Eramosa Mills Development Ltd., said he hopes to have an agreement for the 22-lot proposal by fall so construction can start in the spring.

Eden Heights cleared the Ontario Municipal Board because there were no objections to changing the zoning of the land, on part of Eden Mills southside, to residential.

Mr. Gamsby proposed changes in what he called the key issue of road construction before an agreement can be written. A design for reconstruction of Concession 2-3 puts the cost at between \$75,000 and \$90,000, Mr. Gamsby said. That would ditches. shoulders and asphalt.
