Doodles is a funny name for a restaurant but a most logical choice for Maureen and John McLeod, Doodles parents in more ways than one.

When the McLeods decided to open a family restaurant in Rockwood, the name was their easiest selection. Doodles is one of the nicknames of their fourth and youngest child, Joseph.

The restaurant, situated on the north corner of Alma and Main Streets, makes its home in the re-furbished Jansen home, a house with a long Rockwood history. The property has been owned by many families including that of Max Storey, popular auctioneer, and has long been a village landmark.

John McLeod, engineer, builder, contractor, undertook to change a residence into a dining house and has done an interesting job. The pine floors are original and the lovely fieldstone fireplace now part of the main dining room, warmed the Jansen family not so long ago. The sunporch is now a children's playroom.

A soft pleasant decor makes the visitor feel right at home. Maureen, an ex-nurse, an artist and potter in charge of her own pottery and retail outlet called Frogpots, has combined soft woods, tile, plants, ecru fabrics, and handmade pots with modern posters and whimsical art.

"We wanted to get away from dusty looking antiques," she explains.

The piece de resistance for children of all ages, is a beautiful century maple carousel horse who surveys the dining room. The horse, Nellie, used to be part of the Conklin Circus shows and was once on the old Winnipeg carousel. It took a whole summer of massive repair to the old horse who lay in dry lifeless pieces. The result is a better-than-new equine with classic head and flowing horse-hair tall.

Since opening for business last spring, Doodles has enjoyed growing success with many repeat customers coming to enjoy wholesome food made of natural ingredients as lovingly as a mother would make. Maureen has had considerable experience in this area. The four results of her motherly cuisine now help in the restaurant. Kathryn 15 and Kelly 13 take a turn at the slove or at table while Christopher 11 is part-time caretaker and Joseph, 2, is learning to run the cash register (or he was the last time I was in there-much to the horror of his mother).

Good food, a fireplace, enjoyable people-and Nellie the carousel horse-all to be found in a historic Rockwood residence.
