Schneider's candy factory has been sold but will remain a maker of fine hand-made sweets.

As of Friday December 14, Pat Herne of Kitchener becomes the owner of Schneider's Reliable Sweets. Original owners, Frank and Clarence Schneider, will be free to retire although they plan on being very much a part of the new operation.

First storted in 1923 by the Schneider brothers' father, the factory moved to its present location on Main Street, Rockwood, in 1945.

Mr. Herne, president and owner of Park-Lane Jewellery, a manufacturing company, first approached the Schnelders about leasing the top floor of the candy factory. One thing led to another and now Pat Herne is in the candy business. Park-Lane Jewellery will still operate from the top floor of the building.

Paul Ruttan of Cambridge will become general manager of the candy making division. After many months apprenticing under veteran candy maker, Frank Schneider, Paul will take over next week. He's 23, single, and eligible, girls!

One of the most recent innovations is the opening of a factory outlet store at the front of the factory where customers will be able to buy candy in bulk or by the piece.

Business is growing, Mr. Herne said, as more and more retail outlets place orders. Schneider's Reliable Sweets can be found from London to Toronto and Hamilton to Mount Forest.

"Our biggest asset is that we still make everything by hand." said Mr. Herne. In a world of mass production, people are seeking handmade products and the finest candy in Ontario can be found in Rockwood.
