With the opening recently of Heady's, in the old A.J.'s Place building, Frank is available to work on local residents' hair, whether standard trim, or a wild new fashion.

Frank has been in the hairdressing business for 11 years, and comes to Acton directly from working with Bruce Crescento, a famous hairstylist in Toronto.

Co-workers Monica Knoepfl and Shari Robbins also come from well known places. Monica worked for some time at the Haircutting Place in Simpsons at Shoppers' World, and Shari comes from Glemby International in Eatons in Brampton.

All attend regular workshops teaching the latest of fashions and styles, and are able to provide a unique and modern range for their clients.

Individuality is emphasized at Heady's. If a client wants a particular look, Frank, Shari and Monica will be honest and tell that person whether the style will suit their face and personality. Most of the time the client appreciates their honesty. People walking past on the street are encouraged to come in and ask advice, even if they are not ready to have their hair done.

In the shop, complete renovations have transformed the building into a very modern, relaxing atmosphere. None of the stylists wear uniforms, preferring to dress up for

work. Shari explains uniforms are old fashioned. The shop offers discount cards for those who get their hair permed or colored there, Shari says. Once a client gets their hair done, they are presented with the card, which can be used four more times within a year, whether for a perm or color. Someone who got the card for a color can use it for a perm

later on. The card is also transferrable to a friend, who is entitled to come in and get a perm or color at 20 per cent off. Heady's, a branch of the Heady's in Milton, Mass. offers Henna treatment for split ends, and special kinds of shampoo. A regular client can purchase a bottle and leave it in the shop. The next time they are in, shampoo will be taken out of

that same bottle which has been put away for her use. At the present time, the three only do hairstyling, both men and women. However, they say, they eventually would like to get into manicuring, makeup and ear-piercing. These will be offered when clients request it enough to make it feasible. They are now doing eyebrows.

Conflict of interest termed — "absurd"

A letter from the town solicitor pointing out a possible conflict of interest when councillors sit on boards and commissions, then vote on related matters at council has posed a problem for Halton Hills councillors. Councillor Roy Booth, a member of the Georgetown hospital board and the Niagara Escarpment Commission declared possible conflicts of interest on minor items. Councillor Harry Levy attacked the idea of such conflict in such situations, emphasizing councillors are appointed to boards specifically to bring information back to council and said it is ridiculous if they cannot discuss the items at council meetings. PARKING

Parking of a vehicle on streets between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 7:00 a.m. for a period of time longer than three consecutive hours, is prohibited by by-law. As on street parking hinders snow cleaning operations, please comply with the requirements of this by-law.

Authorities may have vehicles ticketed or towed away at the owner's expense.

SNOW CLEANING:

Placing of snow or ice on streets in any manner as to obstruct or encumber is prohibited by by-law. As improper snow and ice cleaning can be a serious hazard, please comply with the requirements of the by-law so as not to create a hazard.

Authorities may have the snow and ice removed at the property owner's expense.

YOUR CO-OPERATION IS NECESSARY TO ENSURE EFFECTIVE WINTER CONTROL MEASURES AND SAFE CONDITIONS.

Common connections

Halton Regional Council will no longer approve condominium registrations unless service mains are external and protrude from a "common element."

A common element is any portion of the building which is not part of the privately owned condominium homes.

The common element is that portion of the structure which each condominium corporation has the right of access and is therefore able to undertake the maintenance of the service mains without infringing upon individuals' rights and living space.

Until two years ago, it had been a common practice in the region for condominium units to be

constructed with water and sewer mains running under individual units.

It was less costly to build into the overall plan and thus made the purchase price of individual units slightly less. It worked well as long as the property was under the ownership of one landlord who would have had the right to access to make repairs as necessary.

However, when a one-

owner building (usually rental) is turned into a condominium, the units become private property and therefore access is not easy. In most cases each unit is dependent on pipes passing under all other units.

To end this problem, public works committee has recommended that in future, the common element be part of any condominium registration plan before it can be approved.
