Georgetown District Commander Inspector Alexander Terrell will be leaving to assume District Commander duties in Burlington.

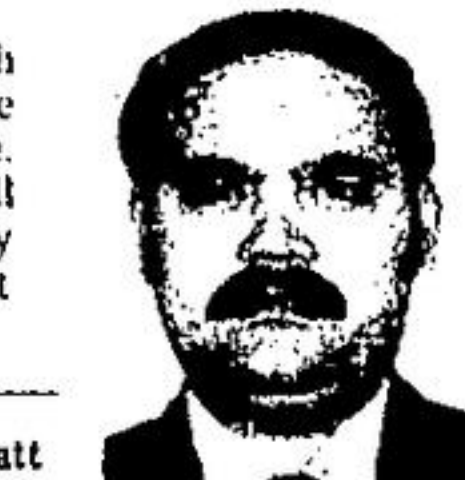
Present Staff Sargent John Barratt has been appointed to the rank of acting Inspector and will

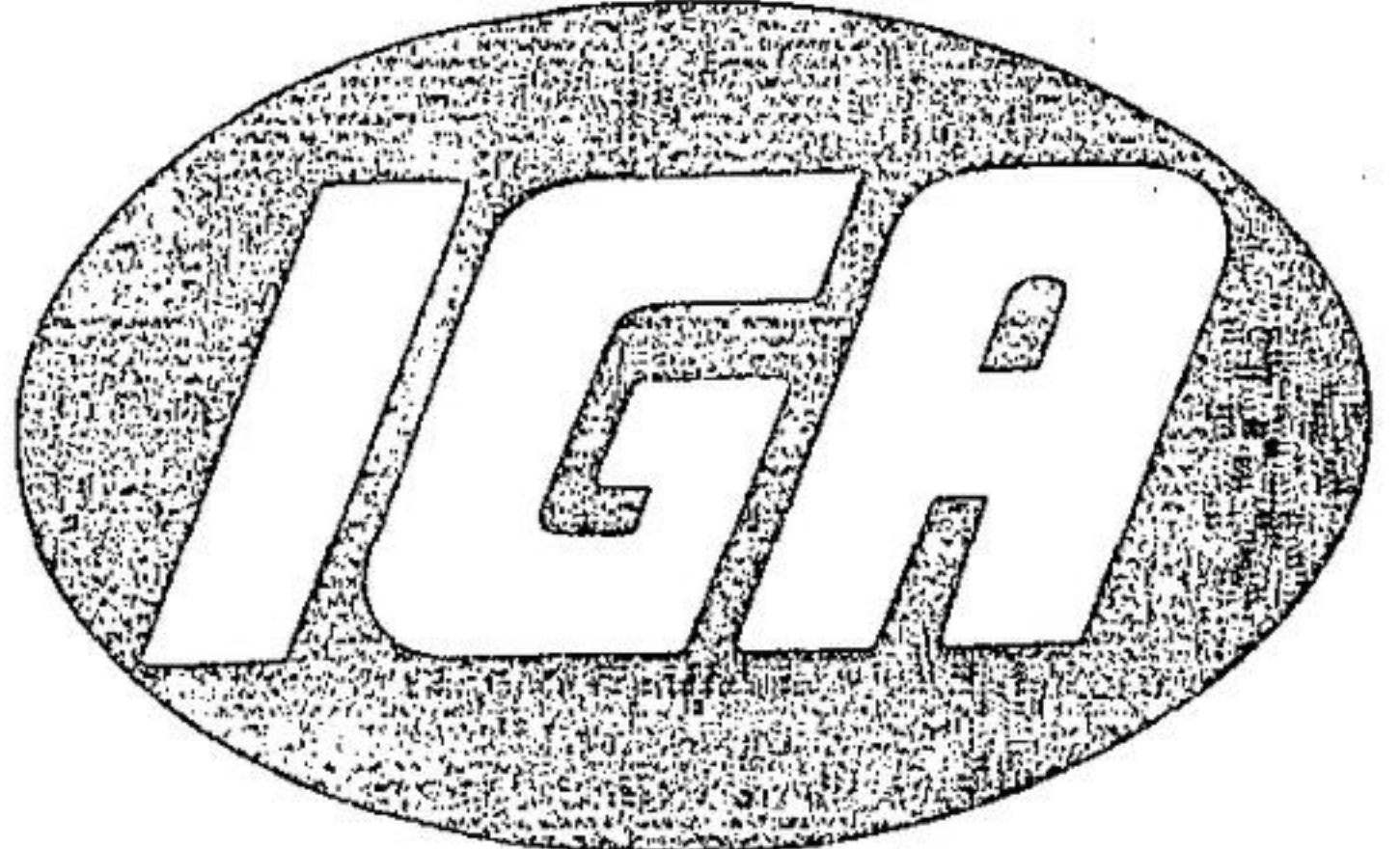

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills intends to pass a by-law to stop up, close and convey a portion of unopened road allowance known as River Street, located in the former Town of Georgetown, described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Halton Hills in The Regional Municipality of Halton (formerly Town of Georgetown) in the Province of Ontario and being composed of that part of River Street lying between Ontario Street and Ewing Street as shown on Registered Plan No. 69 in the Registry Office for The Regional Municipality of Halton (No. 20), and further shown as Parts 1 to 9 inclusive on Plan of Survey by M.P. VanHarten.

The Council or a Committee of the Council will hear in person, or by their counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that their land will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard at a meeting to be held in the Council Chambers at the Municipal Offices, Trafalgar Road on the 21st day of January, 1980 at the hour of 7:30 p.m. in the evening.
