



### Prize catch

An Acton fisherman has won a prize in Molson's Big Fish contest. John "Bus" Chisholm of 244 Mason Boulevard cast on a sunny Friday last September in the Nottawasaga River in Sunnidale Township and hooked an 18 lb. 7 oz. rainbow trout. He ranked eighth in that category, enough to win a \$20 prize and a Micheal Dumas print for catching a trout over the minimum six pounds. This isn't the first prize catch for Chisholm, who has been catching big ones for 40 years. He had also won a prize for an oversized pickeral several years ago. To hook the trout he said, he drifted a small roe cluster. More than 1000 people entered the annual contest in 1979, which awarded \$4,500 in prize money. Top prize was \$150 for a first-place fish. The contest was run by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.
