Waples day at raceway

It was not Ron Waples' day.

The Ontario Jockey Club and the provincial government may have declared it Ron Waples Day and the 10,983 fans who attended Greenwood raceway for the New Year's ceremony may have favored the Rockwood driver in six of his nine races, but it was definitely not Ron Waples' day.

Waples, who captured the 1979 North American dash-winning title and drove to 440 first-place finishes last year, didn't win a single race on the first day of a brand-new decade.

But If 1979 is any indication, the talented driver will have no problems repeating his performance for the 1980s. He finished first 364 times on the Greenwood-Mohawk circuit and his trotters earned \$1,462,468 in winnings last year.

In recognition of his achievements, Waples received cufflinks, a composite photograph showing his 400th Canadian victory, a horse blanket naming him as the '79 dash-winning champ and a plaque presented to him by Ontario Consumer Affairs Minister Frank Drea, in a ceremony after the fifth
