Jelinek urges

Move Moscow Olympics

Progressive Conservative candidate and Halton MP Otto Jelinek announced Monday night at the opening of his Acton campaign headquarters, that he and his sister Maria have sent a telegram to the president of the International Olympic Committee urging the 1980 summer Olympics be moved out of Moscow.

In his message to Lord Killanin, Jelinek notes, as former Olympians he and his sister support the ideal that "under normal circumstances" politics shouldn't mix with sports but the Russian invasion of Afghanistan is "anything but normal."

"It contravenes all human decency and blatantly contradicts the Helsinki Human Rights Agreement," which both Canada and Russia signed, he declared.

Jelinek says it would be "sheer madness" for the western world to join in the Moscow Olympics

under the "present circumstances" since the Soviets use the Olympics as their "primary propaganda tool."

He and his sister urged Killanin support President Jimmy Carter and Prime Minister Joe Clark and Margaret Thatcher, "as well as millions of other freedom loving peoples around the world" and take immediate steps to move the Olympics to a site "other than Moscow or Soviet satellite countries."

"Retaliation of this nature far outweighs retaliation by force. Do not allow the I.O.C. to become completely hypocritical. It is a well known fact the I.O.C. has intervened for political reasons in the past, be it Hitler, South Africa or more recently the Taiwan issue," Jelinek concluded.

He also announced he will introduce a private members bill in the next house that a government,

no matter what political stripe, be guaranteed a mandatory minimum stay in office of two years. Jelinek noted this would have allowed a government like the six month old Clark regime to stay in office enough time so the public could properly assess it. He said Tory programs and policies weren't even given enough time to work their way into the system to see if they would be effective before the Liberals and New Democrats pulled the plug and forced a costly, unfair and unnecessary election.

Jelinek warned a return to the Liberals will mean a crippling deficit for "our children and grandchildren" and more living by the government and people of Canada in an "Alice in Wonderland" situation which has left every man, woman and child in the country paying \$350 a

year just to service the national debt.

Youth charged with arson

The meetings will be held Mondays at 1:30 p.m. and Wednesdays at 7:30 p.m.

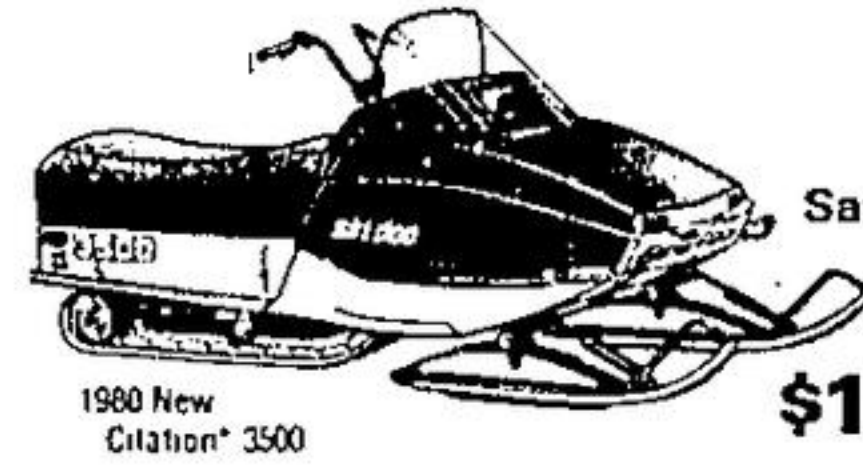

Board looking at sites for new Catholic school

The site for the new Catholic school in Acton is expected to be decided within the next month, according to Director of Education Cliff Byrnes.

Byrnes said the Halton Separate school board is seriously considering two sites in Acton and are investigating the feasibility of each.

St. Joseph's school principal Sean Briggs said the present school in the old stone building beside Robert Little has seen quite a bit of growth during the three years of operation. Opened in September 1977 with a predicted enrolment of 90 students, the school enrolled an actual 115 students. To present the student population at St. Joseph's including the recently acquired portables is 199 students.

Briggs said the need for a new school is both one of size and facilities. "We were lucky to obtain a lease on this building from the Halton

public school board however in order to provide the learning programs,

we need the facilities which exist in any school," he said.
