LDC says rocky paddock no reason for severance

An application for a 17-acre land severance by Benny Lorrman from his 47-acre parcel on the Eighth Line by Ballinafad, was turned down by Halton Land Division Committee, this week, despite solid support from neighbors.

Lorrman wants to separate the parcel so he can have land free of rock outcropping closer to a new barn which he would build on the severed land, he told the LDC.

According to the application, another house would be built on the 17-acre parcel and the house and barn on the remaining 30 acres sold.

Both the town and regional planning departments opposed the application, claiming the minimum acreage for farm purposes is 25 acres. They stated the severance would fragment the farm.

Citing policy they stated the land should have been out of agricultural use for at least three years and emphasized this included pasture land.

Chairman Brian Fletcher said there were several letters from neighbors supporting the severance and read a section from one by John Goebel. It pointed out the farm had fallen into decay and the house was plagued by vandals, before being purchased by Lorrman who cleaned up the debris. He asked the committee to look favorably on the plan since he felt it would enhance the area.

Bert Arnold, solicitor for Lorrman, explained his client bought the land in 1974 and built a new country-style home on the site of the burned out house.

Arnold said Lorrman became interested in horse breeding and built paddocks, but due to the rock outcropping on the land ran into trouble when a horse was injured and he realized he could not carry on a thoroughbred operation on the portion of the farm.

Veterinarian R. Footman told the committee the horses had bruised soles and he warned Lorrman he would have to change the horse's

environment. "He can't continue successfully with the present paddocks," he stated. He said a 17-acre parcel would be enough for five brood mares.

LDC member Lloyd Chisholm asked, "Why do you need to separate the land, just pasture the horses down there?"

Lorrman replied the thoroughbred mares have to be led down to the pasture and emphasized it is 1,200 feet from the barn. He said that is 1,200 feet each way for each horse, then similar trips carrying water into the paddocks. He said the horses simply graze there and are fed in the barn.

"With the severance I could have my house and barn much closer and could keep an eye on the horses," he said.

He told the LDC he has two paddocks in front of his house, which he uses now, but people throw rocks and bottles at them.

Arnold explained during foaling there will be a closed circuit television camera to watch the birth and make sure everything is going well.

He argued the regional plan does not contemplate horse breeding operations, and contended such an operation enhances the rural character of the area. He said Lorr
