Rockwood DIGEST

Seven election candidates from the Guelph riding attended the All-Candidates Meeting held Monday night at the Rockmosa Community Cen-

An estimated 50 politically interested people and a handful of Rockwood Centennial School grade eight students heard the federal government hopefuls state their parties' positions.

First to speak was Bob Cruise of the Marxist-Leninist Party, expounding his distaste for the "I'll look forward to the day when the country

is not ruled by a handful of foreign monopoly capitalists." He talked about unemployment, blaming the rich and lying politicans. He stated the Marxist-

Leninist Party believed unemployment wouldn't be solved until there was a total change of the whole social system. Jim Finamore of the New Democratic Party remarked on what the NDP considered the shameful performance of the present govern-

ment, quoting cost of living figures, interest rates, unemployment and energy costs. He promised an immediate reduction of 2 per cent in interest rates and a \$40 increase on monthly senior citizen cheques. He also promised a shelter tax credit for those on fixed incomes and the establishment of a commission to examine realistic oil prices. The NDP want the price of oil to reflect the actual cost, said Finamore, adding PetroCan should be the only purchaser of off-shore oil and there should be a two

price system, one for Canadians and one for ex-

port. Progressive Conservative candidate, Albert Fish, was absent because of hospitalization. The Lambden-Middlesex riding candidate, Sld Fraileigh, spoke on Fish's behalf. Fraileigh said he, and the Progressive Conservative party in general, were going to fight the election based on the issues in the defeated budget. "We couldn't wave a magic wand and correct all the ills of 12 years," he said. "Our governmental plan was for four years, not 48 days-governments do not run on overnight miracles."

He went on to elaborate on the many improvements already initiated by the PC's in their short time in office.

Communist candidate, Alan Pickersgill, said Canada needed a real change, first at the level of leadership and next to take a totally new direction. He opted for public ownership and democratic control. He called for a job for each and every person a right, and control of the large corporations.

Liberal candidate Jim Schroder, spoke on a personal level, introducing himself as a longtime resident of Guelph and area and an enthusiastic civic worker. He said he was interested in the voice of the community. He said, the issues were energy, economy and the need for a strong central government. He said the Liberals would oppose the 18 cent a gallon tax on gasoline since it is a regressive tax hitting those who can least afford to pay for it. He felt strengthening and expanding PetroCan was the key to energy sup-

Libertarian Brian Seymour stated the high inflation rate under the Trudeau regime was due to the federal government's monetary policy. The numbers of dollars in circulation were allowed to grow out of proporation to actual money value. Increase of created paper money devalued the nctual dollar. He said Libertarians believed in simplifying the government; stablizing the money in use and tying it to the gross national product; and balancing the budget by increasing taxes or controlling spending. "We would cut ten percent off every budget" he commented.

Rhinoceros candidate, Steve Thorning, said the rhino stood for their political party because the animal was thick-skinned, short sighted and liked to wallow in mud. He appeared in a false nose, saying politicians should be ashamed to show their faces in public.

Lively questions from the audience and summary speeches from the candidates completed the evening.
