Skaters make appeal for extra funds

The Acton Figure Skating Club is making an appeal to town businesses and citizens in order to raise the extra \$1,000 it needs to balance its budget.

Funds for the club usually come from membership dues, but operating costs were increased this year when the town of Halton Hills raised the ice rental fee to \$33.

Also the club's enrolment was down this year. Mona Petrillo, spokesperson for the club, said

members have already raised \$1,000 through a bake sale, raffle and skate-a-thon but they are still \$1,000 short, although membership fees were increased for each group by \$10-\$15.

The club's winter carnival, to be held at the end of March, should be a money-maker, said Petrillo, but it will also cost close to \$1,000 to produce it.

"The club was touch and go this year," she said, "but it looks like we'll make it this year. We're just a small club, struggling to make it.

"We might have to cut back on ice time, for next year however," she added. Right now the club rents about 17 hours week, spending more than \$2,000 a month on rental fees.

Petrillo said with registration fees averaging \$70 a year, each group getting two hours of lessons from October to March it works out to about \$1 a lesson.

She also noted the club is the only figure sknting available in Acton, since the recreation department does not offer classes. The club has only been involved in competition for the past three or four years. she added. Before that it was like a recreation club. Skaters will be travelling to Sarnia in March for

an international competition.

against last years divisional winners in the process. Although no trophies came home the


team thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

An open letter to one of the older professions

Dear Journalists,

Amateurs are often delightful and useful people, but there are limits. The Canadian Medical Association, for example, gets very upset with even well-intentioned amateurs who attempt appendectomies, or cancer cures. And if the CMA weren't there to enforce professional standards, the doctors themselves would come down hard on the pretenders. To protect their patients. To protect themselves. To know who the real doctors were.

Where is this steel in journalism, among Canada's editors and reporters and columnists and commentators? Where is the stern self-regulation that defines every true profession?

Not all, but many of you journalists today don't seem to understand your responsibility to the public. You act as though being vivid and grammatical were enough, as though no other qualifications were needed.

Among your ranks is the "busi-

ness writer" who goes far beyond reporting facts and informed opinion. You interpret economic matters, like a latter-day J.K. Galbraith. Your cousin is the "science columnist" with only the most marginal grasp of the scientific and technological galaxies he tosses around with such rich and persuasive jargon.

When you and he go further, and praise or damn or otherwise edit news (and that means information) on the basis of its morality, economic cast, social implications, environmental orthodoxy and consequences for international trade, you are a danger to everybody:

You are a danger to the people who accept your pretense of authority, the people whose opinions are moulded and whose thinking is thereby confined by your bite-sized bits of instant expertise, the people whose understanding you control.

You are a danger to the real experts, who are rarely blessed with coherence. Their attempts to tell the

public what they know are swamped in the wake of your memorable phrases and dazzling facility and utter assurance.

Above all you are a danger to your profession, to journalism. The makeup is showing. More and more people have stopped believing you, and therefore your whole tribe. You're teaching the public that journalists are posturers, ego- and power-trippers, shallow little pretenders whose only understanding is of words.

Stop and think. If you lose us, we lose you and with you a key freedom. And unless you regain your standards, you will lose us. There is nothing more unforgiving than betrayed faith. Without the faith of patients, there would be no doctors. Without the faith of voters, governments fall or become the enemy. Without the faith of the public, journalism dwindles to mere entertainment. Whorish entertainment. By amateurs.



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
