INFORMATION:

1. Times: Registration will begin at 8:45 a.m. in all schools. Necessary afternoon sessions will begain at 1:00 p.m.

2. Tax Support: Evidence of Public School Tax Support will be required. This information is shown on your 1980 tax bill. Please bring copy of your tax bill on the day of registration. If you do not have a tax bill, special forms will be on hand for completion.

3. Age: The child must be 5 years of age by December 31, 1980 to be eligible for enrolment in September, 1980.

4. A birth certificate or notice of birth registration is required for proof of age and must be presented at time of

5. If a child was not born in Canada, status of citizenship must be presented at time of registration.

6. Please bring immunization records and any other pertinent medical information. The Public Health Nurse will be talking to you about your child's health and development and will be conducting hearing and vision tests on registration day.

Personnel from The Wellington County Soard of Education and The Wellington-Dufferin-Gueigh Health Unit will conduct a pre-kindergarten inventory for the 1980 Kindergarten children so that programs may be planned for the individual child. 8. Parents who wish to enrol their children in French Immersion Kindergarten classes will enrol them at their home

school at the same time as the regular Kindergarten registration. A newsletter regarding the French Immersion Kindergarten Program will be available upon request during the two weeks prior to registration at your home school. 9. SEWER RATE COMMITTEE

A Sewer Rate Committee has been established by the Region to consider appeals from customers regarding their Regional sewer surcharge rates.

Sewer surcharge rates are charged to all persons who have access to sewers, whether connected or not. The Sewer Rate Committee has received a number of letters from persons (residential, commercial and industrial) who are requesting exemption because they are not actually connected to sewers.

The Sewer Rate Committee wishes to establish a policy to deal with these requests.

Written submissions will be received in regard to the appropriate charge if any for persons not actually connected to the sanitary sewer system. Any person (residential, commercial or industrial) who wishes to submit an appeal on this basis, or who wishes to have his/her views considered in respect to this matter should submit his/her views in a letter to be forwarded not later than March 15, 1980 to:
