Booth fails to trim mileage

A bid by Councillor Roy Booth to reduce proposed mileage hikes for town employees using their own cars failed Monday night at Halton Hills general committee.

A staff report, which was approved by committee, calls for employees to receive 25 cents a mile for the first 5,000 miles and 22 cents a mile for every mile after

5,000. Department head will receive a flat rate of \$85 a month. These new rates, which must still be approved next week by council, are retroactive to the beginning of March.

The councillors directed the clerk's office to convert the mileage rates to metric which means staff will receive 15.5 cents a km for first 8,046 km and 13.7 centre a

km for each km after 8,046.

Booth urged the rate be 15 cents a km for the first 4,000 km, 12.5 cents per km for the next 8,000 km, and 10 cents a km after 12,000 km.

He said this would mean the staff wouldn't

receive quite as much compensation for driving their own cars as the report urged, but felt the rates he proposed compared favorably with those given in other municipalities and by other government agencies.
