# Press leads playoff final

Blow Press is leading the Industrial Hockey League finals after weekend action at the Acton Community Centre.

Blow Press dumped Acton Terminal Warehouse 7-3 in the semi-finals Saturday night, before meeting Hellers, who defeated Lakeview Centre 6-4, in Sunday's match-up. There the Pressmen held on for a 5-3 victory, in the best of three series.



Confused? Some of us are positive the Ontario Minor Hockey Association has dreamed up it's schedule with the sole purpose of creating mass confusion for coaches and nightmares for harried sports writers.

You see, the Acton allstar teams play in Waterloo-Wellington (W-W) league, along with Orangeville, Woolwich, Hespler, Fergus and New Hamburg. At the end of the regular season however, Acton does not enter W-W playoffs, but competes in the OMHA playdowns against other BB teams.

(Acton is in BB class in OMHA along with Fergus and New Hamburg because of it's population. Other classes include AAA, AA, BB, etc.)

Whoever survives the first two rounds of OMHA advances into OMHA playoffs. Those who are knocked out return to W-W to finish those playoffs-whether consolation or championship. Now then. This is where the Acton allstar teams

stand as of March 17; Ed's In-N-Out midgets are embroiled in OMHA semi-finals against Petrolia. Their coach is Cope Smith, they ended in first place in the league and lost only three games all season, not including

They will face Fergus in the W-W championship. Beardmore minor peewees came fourth in the league with a 7-9-2 record for 16 points. They are

coached by Jim Haggett. They defeated Elmira in two straight games in the first round of best-of-three OMHA playdowns. Beardmore proceeded to dump Fergus three games to two in the second round before losing to Orangeville in the quarter-finals.
