## Sabres lay merger to rest on to business of raising funds

The new Acton Sabre executive was elected last Wednesday night, and wasted no time in putting ideas of a merger with Georgetown Gemini to rest.

Lee Vickery, named president for the second year in a row, said a letter would be sent to the Georgetown Gemini stating since neither side had a concrete proposal, the matter should be dropped—at least for this year—and wished the Gemini the best of luck in 1980-81.

The new executive looks pretty much like last year's edition, except for Sally Allsop who takes over the post of secretary. Jane Vickery, Lee's wife, was elected vice-president by acclamation, Molly Allsop returns as treasurer by acclamation, and Frank Allsop, Jim Gordon, Ray

Graham and Cope Smith were elected directors, at the sparsely-attended meeting.

The Georgetown Gemini did not send a representative, but did mail a letter to Vickery saying two members of their executive had guidelines if there was a proposal, and to contact them before the OHA convention April 5.

However, no one at the meeting was in favor of a merger. The general feeling was that Acton would lose the team altogether in a merger. Questions about home games, community spirit and friendly rivalry were raised.

Vickery said the decision didn't belong to the present executive but should include the town and past players.

After disposing of the Gemini matter, the new

executive went on to discuss their most important topic—making money. The Sabres club received an official charter naming them a charitable organization, which means donations by companies and citizens can be deducted from income tax.

The Sabres are also planning their annual hall tournament for June 13, 14, and 15, at Prospect Park.
