The Rotary Club prolonged the series by coming up with a big victory in the third game Tuesday, April 1. Acton nipped Hespeler 2-1.

Dodds then proceeded to give Acton a two-goal lead with less than a minute remaining in the perlod. Paul Cargill assisted on the marker.

Hespeler put themselves on the scoreboard early in the third period on a goal by Halliwell, but couldn't connect for an equalizer.

Acton held on for the victory. Hespeler was winning 5-3 in the second contest in Hespeler March 29, when a curfew was called at 7.30 with 5.14 left in the 15 minute third period.

# AIVITA to Join Hub league Waterloo-Wellington dropped

The Waterloo-Wellington hockey league seems destined to be written into the history books after

The W-W league has been dropped by the Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) after Orangeville jumped into the Tri-County league.

That leaves Acton as well as Hespeler, Woolwich, Fergus, New Hamburg the remnants of W-W looking into the possibility of joining the HUB league. Nothing is finalized, however, and won't be until the next OMHA and HUB league meetings.

The dismantling of W-W follows a complex series of steps starting with Orangeville's break. Hespeler and Woolwich demanded changes because with Orangeville gone, they were the only remaining "A" level teams left in W-W.

Acton Minor Hockey Association (AMHA), would

have preferred to remain in the W-W according to vice-president Herb Dodds. "But if we wanted a league to play in, we had no choice.

"Though a final decision won't be reached until the revised HUB league meets, it's hoped by the Acton executive the schedule will consist of home and home series with each centre. Each centre will come once to Acton," he continued.

The change means for one thing, more games. In the HUB league, Acton would play 22 games instead

of 18 as they played last season. AMHA president Bruce Cargill said the change wouldn't mean any more expenses or travelling time, but neither does it mean any less.

He said the Association was told at last month's meeting, W-W league would remain intact for at least another year.

But at last Wednesday's meeting, representatives from each team voted to dismantle it.

He said as long as the OMHA sticks to the proposal of home and home games there should be no major changes. Whatever they decide, says Cargill, the AMHA has to abide by it.

Acton would be booking into the Mantle Division of the Hub league, along with Woolwich, Hespeler, Fergus, New Hamburg and Elora.

Second teams would be Galt, Brantford, Waterloo and perhaps Guelph with third teams from Kit-

Renegade Orangeville teams will face second teams from Burlington and Oakville in Tri-County and first string squads from Flamborough, Ancaster, Streetsville, Chinguacousy, Dundas, Brampton, Georgetown and Milton.
