Liberal mini-budget underhanded—Jelinek

The Liberal mini-budget brought down in the House of Commons last week was "underhanded" according to Halton MP Otto Jelinek.

"What they did was smuggle budget measures in during the Throne Speech debate. It was an underhanded way of doing it and a irresponsible move. It gives the opposition parties no opportunity to comment," Jellnek complained in an interview this week.

He asked how a responsible government could bring in half a budget, the part that hurts consumers and business through higher taxes on liquor, cigarettes and corporate taxes, but does nothing to reduce government spending. Jelinek says that in light of the fact the tax hikes Finance Minister Allan MacEachean brought "are identical to the penny" as those proposed in the previous Conservative government's budget he obviously agrees with the increases. However, he finds fault with the minibudget since it doesn't cut government spending. The only tax hike the Liberals didn't bring in last week was the 18 cent a gallon gas excise tax. It would be understandable if Jelinek and his Tory colleagues

felt vindicated by the Grit's mini-budget since it is so similar to the Conservative budget but all he really feels is concern about the direction the Liberals are taking the economy.

He is worrled about the projected \$3 billion increase in the deficit that the Liberals are now saying they expect. Jelinek

notes the Tory plan would have reduced the deficit by \$1 billion this year.

"It's another Liberal flip-flop on their election promises," the Conservative Corporate Affairs critic says.
