Betty Jean Hutton ("B.J." to her friends) is a little lady with a big horse doing great things for the world of dressage.

The Nassagaweya resident is doing something very few equestrians even attempt to do. She is rapidly on her way to being one of the top dressage riders in Canada on a Canadian owned, bred, trained and ridden horse.

This sport, the ultimate in English equestrian sports, originates in Europe and Canadian riders, still relatively new in the field either buy their horses from Germany or send them there to be trained.

Betty Jean is training Dominico on Canadian soil, learning as she goes, training herself, and winning while doing it.

In 1978, Dominico was Ontario medium level champion and in 1978 he was reserve champion for Ontario.

Jump to dressage

A few years ago, Betty Jean was like any other horse-crazy little girl paying \$2.50 an hour for a chance to risk her neck on a livery horse.

At 15, still living in Hamilton, she started to take serious lessons with Doug Hood, well-known trainer then living on the Guelph Line. A rapid learner, Betty Jean was soon winning junior jumping classes on one of Doug Hoods show horses, the favorite Gentleman Jim.

University time took Betty Jean out of the equestrian world for five years while she majored in English at McMaster and took a year of postgraduate education studies at the University of Toronto.

After university, Betty Jean taught English and remedial reading at Lord Elgin High School in Burlington until two years ago when she retired to give her full attention to her riding and equestrian school.

Once back to riding after her university hiatus, Betty Jean decided she wanted to specialize in

dressage after seeing Christilot Boylen (Canada's number one dressage expert) perform. Gone was the desire to excell in the show jumping ring. Betty Jean wanted to take up dressage-an ancient and intricate form of horse training that brings out the best of a horse's natural movements.

Attending Imbercourt Riding School in Cambridge, Betty Jean learned a good basic military seat but found it wasn't enough so she went to Germany and England to learn as much as pos-

Dominico enters the picture

. Back home in Canada somewhat disillusioned by European training, Betty Jean bought Grey Stone farm just off the Guelph Line, married Blaine Adams and started training with Lorraine Stubbs, Canadian Dressage champion who has a farm north of Highway 24 in Eramosa.

Schooling with Lorraine became a necessity when Betty Jean found her horse-a 17.1 h.h. scal brown German Coach and Thoroughbred gelding owned by Graham Winter of Guelph.

Dominico has been in Betty Jean's hands for five years since he was a seven year old. The registered Canadian Hunter is a natural mover, powerful and precise in his paces. Betty Jean has

found him a joy to work with. She says she is delighted how far the pair of them have come in less than five years (she spent two years on the ground after a painful back injury). This year she is studying with John Lassiter, a student of the Spanish Riding School, in order to compete at the advanced level of dres-

Dominico and Betty Jean are competing "Intermediare" (advanced) during the 1980 season and so will have to travel to the United States to do it.

"There's not enough horses at this level in Canada for this type of competition". she explains. "The American team trains in the States (all the Canadian horses go to Germany).

"There are 40 American advanced horses so Betty Jean will be competing with them during June and July ending with the largest show of all Devon, before coming home to try for the Advanced championship of Canada in early fall.

Olympics '84? Betty Jean says she really doesn't think there's any necessity to train for them at this time but she does plan on taking Dominico to the ultimate Grand Prix level by

next year-Olympic level work.

"If Dominico makes it to the Grand Prix he'll be the first Canadian owned, trained, and ridden horse to make it. I want to show them it can be done."

"It's my Intention to train him from start to finish, that's why it's taking so long. My intention is to teach and I can't unless I learn the process from A to Z".

Betty Jean is very definite about her ambition to train young Canadian dressage riders on their own soil instead of always running off to Germany. She hopes to prove it can be done with her own case.

Rhythm and strength important

To assist in achieving her goal, the diminutive lady (5 foot, 1 inch tall, 105 pounds) is taking weight lifting courses at a fitness institute in order to keep her huge horse under complete control in all movements. She's also been taking disco classes to aid her sense of rhythm.

"Rhythm is most important (in riding), you have to feel where the horse's feet are going, to give the aid at just the right moment."

In addition to her intensive training with Dominico, Betty Jean runs a riding school of 40 students and is responsible for 22 horses. Five of the horses are school horses, three are her own youngsters' in training, the rest are boarders.

Keep an eye on Betty Jean Hutton, she and Dominico will be making equestrian history in the near future.
