The students have spent many hours in rehearsal preparing for the three concerts they will be giving in Edmonton.

Actonians will have an opportunity to hear the band at its best when they give a free concert tomorrow evening (Thursday, May 15). They will also play for two assemblies at the high school Friday morning to give all the students an opportunity to hear the band before they leave for Edmonton.

McGuire said he wasn't aware of complaints from residents on Churchill Road North, also about speeding, until he had talked to Councilor Terry Grubbe.

Councillor Russ Miller called for a report from the engineer and asked it be brought back to committee in two weeks.

Both Churchill North and South are speedways. Councilor Ross Knechtel declared. He said the police don't seem to be able to solve the problem. A cruiser stops the problem while it is on a street but not the rest of the time. He urged the town ask the police for comments.

The speeding is a "nasty problem" Knechtel declared, adding while there are often objections to stop signs as a method of reducing speeding sometimes they are the only method that will work.

Grubbe said she has received many calls from both sides of Churchill about speeding.

Peter Homer, another resident, said this is the second time residents have come to council about speeding and there was an engineer's report about three years ago, but nothing was done about the problem. He recalled a 60 name petition got no action last time homeowners complained.
