Industry tour success

A tour of industrial properties here on Thursday for real estate agents from outside Halton has been termed a "success and very worthwhile."

Halton Business Development Officer William Marshall and Acton industrial developer Paul Nellson both reported the tour was a big plus in promoting industrial development in Acton.

The jam packed bus toured the industrial park, stopped at the closed Disston plant and visited the vacant building owned by Beardmore which is for rent. The realtors also viewed downtown Acton and the area where the Force Electric plant once stood.

"Without question it (the tour) was successful and worthwhile," Marshall said.

Neilson, who guided part of the tour, had high praise for Marshall's efforts.

Majic says he is disappointed he hasn't received more response from Acton to his petition. He'll knock on doors here this weekend in the hopes of shaking people "out of their apathy."

In a recent interview Halton-Burlington MPP Reed Julian said "hopefully we are over the crest (on interest rates) and going down However that doesn't relieve the strain much on small business, farmers and people renewing mortgages."

He said he was pleased to see the province recently brought in interest rate help for farmers and small businessmen.

"It (the government aid program) will help some. For some it will mean the difference between crops going in the ground this year or not being planted." In the area of mortgage

aid Reed said the Liberal plan restricts assistance to those who have an immediate emergency, homeowners faced with losing their house because of interest rates.

"Our view is these people should be cushioned."




