(Continued from page 1) above the first leaflet with seven or more leaves on it. This will allow the flower to bud again.

Rose Food Roses need fertilizer as well. Give them some rose food fertilizer every four weeks. Mr. Tuitman says if treated right, roses will

bloom from June right through to the first frost, usually in late October and November.

Mr. Tuitman suggests fertilizing again in July, this time with 14-48. The combination calls for a lower level of nigtrogen and higher levels of phosphate and potash to strenghten the plants. Throughout the summer you must remember

to keep your flowerbeds clean. Hoe them, remove the weeds and water the annuals twice a week in a dry summer. By September the garden will be ready for a

winter fertilizer. Choose a 4-9-15, which again is very low on nitrogen along with high levels of potash and phosphates.

Mr. Tuitman said you don't want the grass to grow through the winter, but you do want stronger to withstand the frost and snow. This is the time to plant the bulbs, such as tul-

ips, daffodiles and crocus. They can be planted any time in October as long as you can get in the ground, and they will flower again next spring.
