"The last time lots 29 and 30 on the Fourth Line had road work done was when T.L. Leslie was Esquesing's reeve 50 years ago", Ralph Denny a Fourth Line resident told Halton Hills council Tuesday night.

He presented a petition signed by 62 residents of the Fourth Line on Lots 27 to 32 asking for recon-

struction, improvement, gravel and hardtop. The petition said no major work has been done since regional government was formed and most of the road has had no work at all for many years.

The residents asked for ditching, culverts and a large amount of gravel immediately, and the remainder on a long-term basis.

The petition pointed out traffic has increased greatly since the Ukrainian Youth Camp. There are several new homes beside the road. Many buses use the road. In addition stated the petition, residents of 32 houses on the Fourth Line Erin travel the road to work.

Taxes paid on the five lots in 1979 were listed at

"The councillors all live on hardtopped or oilbased roads and perhaps do not understand the cost of maintenance of vehicles that drive on roads in the condition of the Fourth Line", said the residents brief.

It went on to claim the rural residents receive no benefits from the town, but their taxes help maintain roads and other benefits for urban residents. "We feel discriminated against," said the petition. Councillor Harry Levy contended the rural people

receive the same benefits as urban dwellers. "You don't have crossing guards, but you don't pay for them. Anything the urban residents have extra they pay for separately." "Do you live on a mud road and arrive anywhere with a mud-covered car and mud on your

trousers?" retorted Denny. He said two weeks ago the streets in Acton were being swept in the pouring rain. "We don't want sweeping just some gravel". Councillor George Malthy said he travelled the Fourth Line a great deal and termed it, for these five lots on the Four Line, the worst. He said potholes on the Third and Ninth Lines had damaged his

car, and these were hardtopped roads. Councillor Russ Miller and Pat Patterson called for a report from the engineer on what steps can be taken to alleviate the situation on the Fourth Line in the near future, and for estimates on ditching, culverts and gravel on a longer term basis. The motion
