rely on magazines to keep his waiting eye patients docile. He treats them to a display of antique glasses, frames, cases and lenses. Thirteen pairs of spectacles dating back to 1800 took two years to collect and were the gift of Bob's parents, Bill and Eva Schumacher who contacted their finds through garage sales and flea markets. The older the glasses the smaller the frames. Dr. Schumacher explains, the techniques just weren't around to grind distortionfree lenses. Eye glasses date back to the ancient Chinese who used tortoise-shell for framing instead of the metal of later turn-of-the-century frames. Dr. Schumacher also has a tiny pair of dust goggles resembling miniature strawberry baskets. They are kept in a small tin box and were used for driving early automobiles at racey speeds of 20 mph.






