Strikes hurting police budget, community too

The Halton Community is suffering from the effects of three strikes that have drained police manpower over the past few weeks, admits Halton Police Chief James Harding.

A strike team consisting of between 16 and 18 officers with public relations skills has been assigned to picket lines to develop a better rapport with both company and union officials.

The result is a cut in

manpower from various districts, which means police are taking a longer time to respond to calls, he said. Strikes at Dufferin Aggregates in Milton and Nelson Crushed Stone in north Burlington are blamed for the

Halton Regional Police recorded 18 strikes where police manpower was required last year.

But according to Chief Harding, no more than a couple of officers were required on most occasions.

He estimates approximately \$1,600 is now being spent each week for the strike team of police officers. Chief Harding admitted the

strikes have resulted in a "great deal" more money spent on policing than taxes received from the various companies, but he does not intend to ask for money from those companies affected by the strikes.

"You have to remember they have lost a considerable amount of money, and the workers are not making their wages," he said.

Kirkin' o' the Tartan

A Kirkin' o' the Tartan will be held Sunday, June 8 at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, King and Simcoe Streets, Toronto at 3 p.m.

The origin of the Kirkin' has been lost in time but there are several versions of how it started. The traditional view is that in olden days the Clansmen came together to welcome the spring season. This was usually on the last day of April but it has been celebrated in various regions of Scotland from mid-April to mid-June. The purpose of this gathering was to conjure up the god of fertility; the festival of Beltane is the estra origin of the still lingering pagan commemoration of May Day.

After the '45 when it was illegal to wear, display the Tartan, play the pipes, or sing the Highland songs because of the desire of the English to destroy Highland traditions and culture, the clansmen, by passing the word at this time of year, brought about the means by which these traditions, as we know them today, were perpetuated.

Being Christians, they saw Jesus as the Light of the World and the fulfillment of all life's needs. It was considered fitting that Scots cling to their ancient identities and the meaning of their rites.

Today Scots who are far from their native land help to keep this kinship alive and flourishing. To a degree, we recognize the part the Highland Regiments have played in this, indeed, it has been said that the name "Kirkin' o' the Tartan" was first used by the Royal Highland Regiment, The Black Watch, when attending church parade. The tradition is being carried on in

Toronto by the clans and Scottish Societies of Canada (CASSOC) who are, in conjunction with St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, hosting and organizing this third Bi-Annual Kirkin'. The parade of clansmen and pipe bands assembles at 1:30 p.m. in front of the Parliament Buildings in Queen's Park and moves off at 2:15 to the church by

University Avenue.
