**Strikes hurting police budget, community too**

The Halton Community is suffering from the effects of three strikes that have drained police manpower over the past few weeks, admits Halton Police Chief James Harding.

A strike team consisting of between 16 and 18 officers with public relations skills has been assigned to picket lines to develop a better rapport with both company and union officials.

The result is a cut in manpower from various districts, which means police are taking a longer time to respond to calls, he said.

Strikes at Dufferin Aggregates in Milton and Nelson Crushed Stone in north Burlington are blamed for the major part of more than \$20,000 spent in manning the picket lines.

Nearly 500 workers are also on strike at Rockwell International in Milton, where police have been called on numerous occasions and continue to escort management staff in and out of the gates daily.

Chief Harding said police are required to play a difficult role during strikes and added police do not want to favor either union or company officials.

"It is hard for the men, but I feel they have done a first-class job," he said.

Union officials have charged police with using excessive amounts of manpower on the picket lines.

More than 40 police officers have turned out on several occasions to escort non-striking truck drivers across the lines at both Nelson Crushed Stone and Dufferin Aggregates.

"We must be there as long as there is a breach of peace or a possibility of breach," the Chief said.

Halton Regional Police recorded 18 strikes where police manpower was required last year.

But according to Chief Harding, no more than a couple of officers were required on most occasions.

He estimates approximately \$1,600 is now being spent each week for the strike team of police officers.

Chief Harding admitted the strikes have resulted in a "great deal" more money spent on policing than taxes received from the various companies, but he does not intend to ask for money from those companies affected by the strikes.

"You have to remember they have lost a considerable amount of money, and the workers are not making their wages," he said.

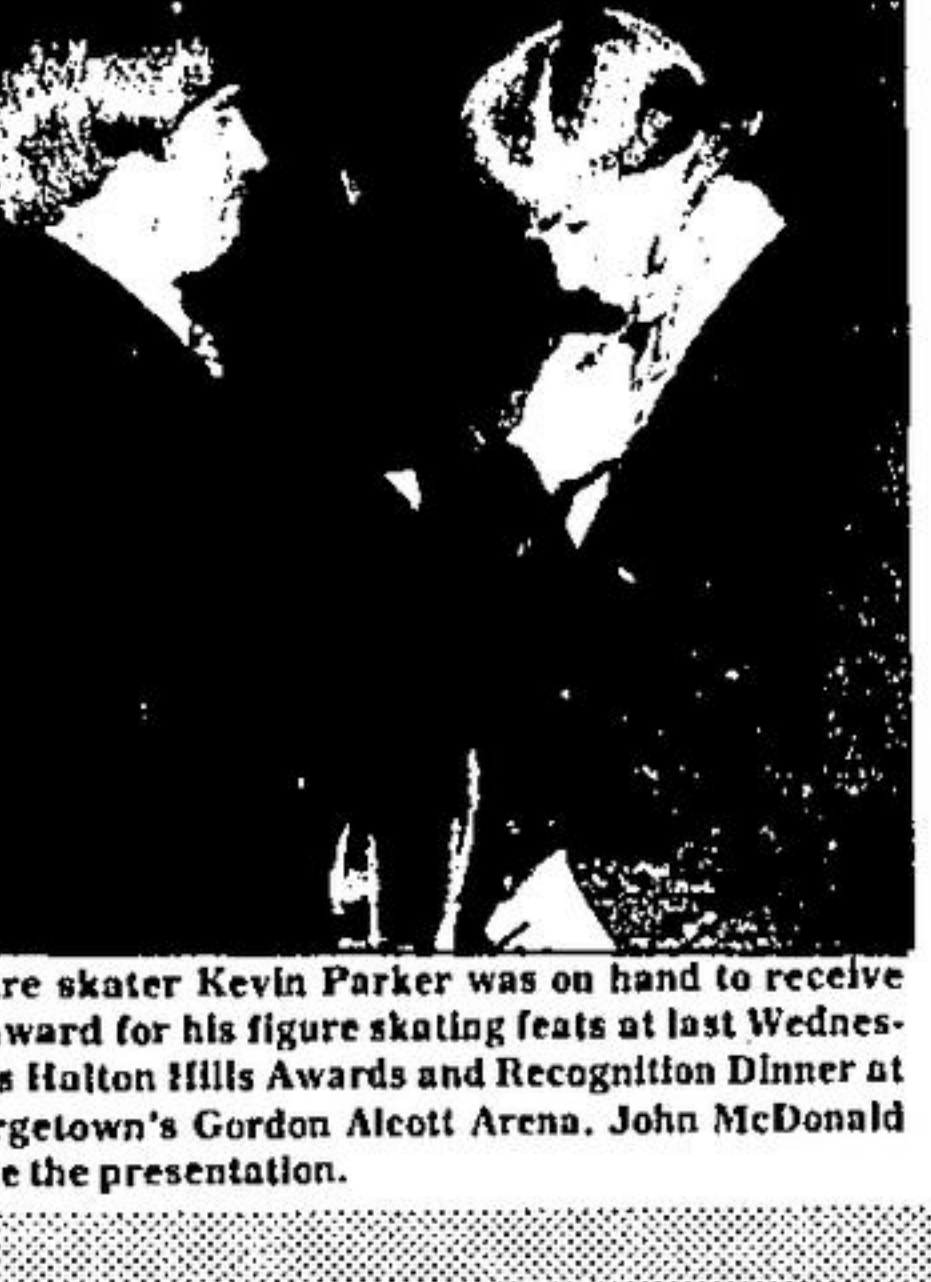
