Two stop signs are going up on Church Street in the hopes of reducing speeding.

Halton Hills general

committee endorsed a report, six months in the making, from engineer Robert Austin calling for stop signs for both directions on Church Street at both John and Wilbur Streets.

In his report Austin notes police checked the

street twice and found once out of 71 vehicles 42 were speeding. The other time 50 of 98 cars were found to be speeding.

Austin noted police say a fatality on the street last December was the result of driver error and there haven't been other accidents in the area.

## Request Churchill stop

A Churchill Road North resident wants the town to put in three way stop signs at both Churchill and Norman Avenue and McDonald Boulevard.
