

A contract award for Halton's 1,165 secondary teachers is expected to be announced today (Wednesday).

Board Education officials and members of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation District 9 met mediatorarbitrator Martin Teplitsky for three days in Toronto on the weekend.

The meetings bring an end to the mediation process which teachers voted to accept earlier this year.




