Students enjoy Washington trip

Our trip down was a long one from McKenzie-Smith in Acton to Georgetown, where we changed buses, then to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. The students and chaperones found that Pennsylvania was really a beautiful state when we travelled through the Appalachian Mountains on our way to Gettysburg. We had a booklet that had to be completed over the five days we were on our trip with questions and to eat lunch. We ranging from John Wilkes visited many museums, Both's profession to the tourists attractions and "top 10" wanted crim-inals to the color of the different states' license plates, to how many of toothpicks would fit in Lake Ontario. When this eight hour tour of Washington performance was over we had time to take pictures and look around the Arlington National Cemetery where John F. Kennedy is buried and we watched the ritual of the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, went on a tour of the White House, visited the Capital, the Lincoln Memorial, the Jefferson Memorial and the daring people went up the Washington Monument, which is 555 feet high.

Chlorine taste in water

One can get used to the taste of chlorine in Rockwood's water, according to Eramosa Township's superintendent, however, he will ask about ways of neutralizing it. "Chlorine, like other tastes, you can become accustomed to it," road superintendent Bob Hamilton told a recent township council meeting. Hamilton agreed to look into the possibility of using an inexpensive filter in pipes bringing water into village homes. The suggestion came from Councillor John McLeod. Hamilton reminded council that the chlorine kills bacteria and prevents the growth of algae in water lines. "We put in a half part per million. With equipment malfunctioning, you can notice it in the water," said Hamilton. The discussion came to light because another councillor, Dave Masson, said he drank the water which he characterized as tasting like javex.
