Emergency sticker studied

Bell Canada will be asked to help Halton Region send out emergency telephone number stickers for application on telephone sets.

The stickers would have the numbers of fire departments, police and ambulance plus one or two other numbers which Regional Council will be asked to consider.

The stickers came from a discussion recently on the possibility of es-

ablishing a "911" emergency number for all of Halton Region. The idea was shot down when it was found the cost would top \$234,000 to implement.

Milton Mayor Don Gordon told the Administration and Finance Committee at the time it might be simpler and cheaper to send out stickers which could be stuck to the telephones of Halton residents. He said this had been done in Milton in years past.

He suggested Bell Canada might send out the stickers with the telephone bill and Chief

Administrative Officer Ernie Reid offered to look into the possibility and report back to committee.

CUPE, board pact

A one-year agreement was reached between the Halton Board of Education and the 227 CUPE Local 1011 full-time workers.

Police await arbitration

An arbitration decision on a new contract for uniformed and civilian members of the Halton Regional Police force is expected in three weeks.

Members of the Halton Region Police Commission and Halton Police Association put forth their arguments at a hearing Friday afternoon before arbitrator Gall Brent.

Negotiations began last December shortly before

the contract ended but reached an impasse in March.

Police are asking for a pay increase of 15 per cent for 1980 that would see the salary of a first-class constable rise from \$21,714 to \$24,971.

An increase of 7.5 per cent has been offered by the police commission that would provide a first-class constable with \$23,342.

The police association is also arguing for two-man patrol cars between 4 p.m. and 8 a.m. to cope with mounting violence in the region.

Two-man patrols are now used in emergencies, and members of the commission expressed concern over the obvious increased costs associated with the proposal.

The Association has also requested the transfer of police cadets from the civilian bargaining unit to the uniformed bargaining unit and a fully paid dental plan.

Region mileage expand

Regional Council will be asked to approve a recommendation that people appointed by council to committees or other public agencies get 24 cents per mile in travel expenses.

This amount is the same as now being paid to councillors and regional staff members who must use their private automobiles from time to time on regional business.
