He's also former president of the Acton Figure Skating Club from 1968-71, former trainer for the Acton Rams Lacross team, from 1973-75, former trainer for the Acton Sabres junior B hockey club from the time they were formed until last season, former trainer of the intermediate B hockey club in 1963 until they folded in 1968, and coach of last year's midget girls baseball

He also coached squirt girls to the Halton rural championships and won in 1977. He says he's just a silent observer in the figure skating club but helps out with the annual ice carnival, has been umpiring minor and industrial ball for about 10 years, all on a volunteer basis. and still finds time to attend high school basketball games because his youngest daughter Lori plays on the team. He's also played a little ball in Haltonville where he moved, along with his parents, from Holland, at the ripe old age of 12.

He had to give up ball because of a sore arm but that didn't stop him from coaching. He has also indulged in a little soccer while as a boy in Holland. You could say Gary DeBruyn is

somewhat involved in the Acton sport Yet it is difficult for him to pinpoint

the highlights. Each sport has so many. "Seeing kids progress, seeing them out there to learn the game-that's the nicest memory," he says.

"I love working with teenage boys. I've worked with some great kids. I guess what sticks out most in my mind as far as hockey is concerned is the year the Sabres went Junior B. We didn't go far, but we weren't outclassed.

"That and seeing Dave Chapman win the scoring champlenship.' He pauses and his face lights up

cerned, he says, he'd like to see a little more discipline on the bench and field. In hockey more emphasis should be placed on teaching the fundamentals of the game than on winning, he states. "We have to teach them how to win

DeBruyn agrees with the new CAHA ruling on bodychecking but doesn't like the severity of penalties.
