The 16 students and teacher Dr. Paul Tamblin recently ended a two-week recreation of 275 years of Canadian history. They undertook a voyageur canoe trip from North Bay to Ottawa.

They could not have accomplished the feat without the backing from several people and Acton companies, so last Wednesday evening at the school the 16 held a special presentation.

After seeing much of what the students accomplished, Halton's Director of Education, Em Lavender commented: "The feeling they have got for each other is really heartwarming and yet, you know, with all due respect to the kids, if you take out Doc and a couple of others, they're just good kids."

Two replicas of the 26 foot fur-traders' canoes were used in the trek. On average some 26 miles of

travel was logged each day, including portages.

Teacher Bill Taylor spent about a week with the crew. In that time he discovered: "This group has endurance in terms of spirit. I learned that as a group, these people tend to take care of themselves."

"They are the only group that continues to hug each other. They are the only group that thinks of itself as a group," observed the history teacher.

Students portrayed such Canadian historical characters as Joliet, Radisson, Col. John By, Indians, surveyors et al.

Recorded music and color slides were used to help the audience see what the voyage entailed.
