An Acton woman was killed late Thursday night when she was struck by a CN freight train near Mill Street.

Barbara Hazelwood, 19 Division Street, Acton, was killed at about 11.40

The accident closed the road at Mill Street for a time and the train blocked Highway 25 North for several hours. A passenger train was delayed outside Acton for three hours.

The CN freight wasn't allowed to leave the scene until shortly after 3 a.m. after Halton Regional Police completed their investigation of the fatality. A number of police were on hand to keep the crowds of spectators back from the tracks.

The engineer reported he blew his horn and put on the emergency brakes after seeing the 41-yearold mother of four standing on the tracks with her arms folded and her back to the train.


