

Glen, Sabres winners at fund-raising ball tourney

Glen Williams Oldtimers walked away as champions of the annual Acton Sabres fastball tournament Saturday, but the big winner was the Junior B hockey club.

Fred Archibald and Pratt batted singles in the seventh but were left on base at the end of the inning. The game ended 9-8 setting up the championship match.

In that game Glen Oldtimers, who had just gotten together before the tournament for the charitable cause, edged Bramalea 4-3. Emile Relic of Bramalea was voted most valuable player of the tournament.

In other tournament games, Glen disposed of Scarborough 7-1 before falling to the Guelph Oldtimers 2-1. Guelph Oldtimers doubled Bramalea Oldsports 6-3 and Scarborough snuffed Limehouse 18-11.

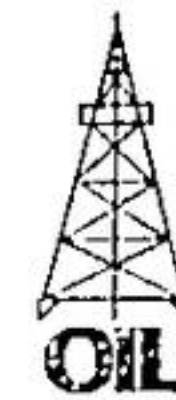

No stopping Roadrunners in tourney
