Police don't like picking kids out of pools or off the road from traffic accidents either, the officer said. He said traffic is also becoming a problem as the summer wears on. He told this newspaper children are becoming careless in traffic as both pedestrians and cyclists. Motorists have been calling police headquarters to report cyclists are not heeding the safety rules they were taught by safety officers before school was let out. Just last week, again in Oakville, a boy darted out from behind a parked car into the path of another moving vehicle.

July rains don't hurt Halton crops

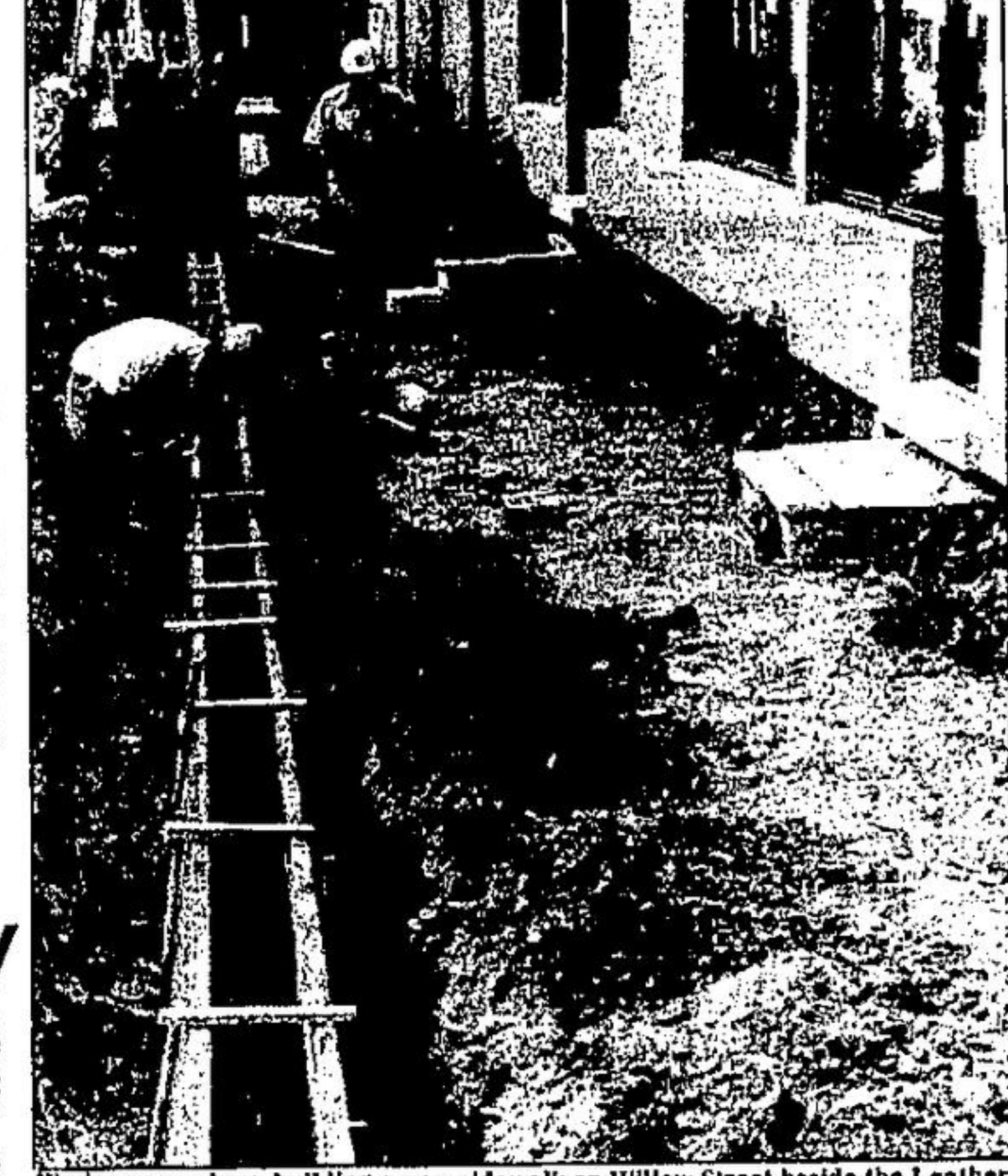
Higher than normal rainfall in July hasn't hurt North Halton farmers much, but two or three weeks of dry air is needed now.
Assistant Agricultural representative Doug Miller reported the heavy rains didn't damage crops in the north of the region like they did in other parts of Southern Ontario.
About seven inches of rain fell in this area in July, over twice the normal average of 2.9 inches.
Miller said the excess rain "wasn't too bad" because most haying operations in this part of Halton were over for the year.
In Essex and Kent counties the rain caused a lot of problems with cereal grains, but that isn't the case in North Halton because the crops here are a few weeks behind.
For instance, in some areas of Ontario wheat has "sprouted" because of the abundant rain. Wheat is normally harvested a few weeks later here.
