Five dogs, two young children and two adults riding in a Volkswagon Rabbit may not be your idea of spacious luxury but Buffy and Don Taylor travel that way regularly.

The dogs are beautifully mannered Shetland sheepdogs-those miniature collie type dogs that are often mistaken for tiny "Lassies"

Most homes with dogs and small children are chaotic but the Taylor home, situated on the village outskirts, belies it's occupants. The dogs sit in their own spots, companiably listening to conversation. They greet visitors with affectionate decorum, no competetive leaping and barking

The Taylors have had Shelties for six years breeding approximately 11 litters from them. Two litters are due by the end of August.

Don is extremely proud of his dogs and describes their breeding and conformation as "finer than most". All the dogs have English blood in their veins and some have been imported.

The Taylors used to show the dogs in obedience trials but now have little time. However, three of

the dogs have their first obedience degree. Don stresses he and Buffy are not in the breeding business, they enjoy their dogs and wish other people to have the pleasure of owning such a pet. With this in mind their dogs are sold much more reasonably than most Shetlands who often fetch prices of \$500 to \$600.

"They make very good pets," Don explains and proves it by giving son David, 3, one of the male dogs to exercise. Dave and Mac go trotting round the house sliding on floors in harmony. Baby Scott, 1, ruffles the ears of a bitch with delicate features and she smiles.

Shetland Sheepdogs were developed as small sheepherding dogs on the Shetland Isles north of Scotland. Some Collie blood was introduced to improve breed coat. However, the breed has remained pure since 1915. The dogs weigh 15 to 20 pounds compared to a standard Collies' 60 to 70 pounds, and stands 13 to 16 inches at the sh-

Five dogs are no more trouble than one, Don feels, and remarks they don't eat as much collectively as one German Shepherd.

"A 20 kg. bag (of feed) lasts us over a month," he comments.

When the dogs are as sweet and quiet as Molly, Candy, Rob, Mac and Poppy Taylor five would be a pleasure.

The name was withheld by police until the young man's parents who live in Italy, could be



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
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
