However, the benefits of fitness far outwelgh the sweat. We have more energy, therefore our productivity increases, whether in housework or newspaper reporting.

That's why I think employee fitness or at least fitness awareness programs should be incorporated into

people's worklife. It's not that our employers are responsible for our fat content. In a town this size with smaller industries, it is ludicrous to think an employer should install a gymnasium in the board room.

But I need motivation.

Participaction has a program out, called Fitness: The Facts. It's not a dieting or exercising program, but more of an education kit. It consists of nix booklets and posters and explains why people should be fit. And how. And what happens if you're not.

The people at Participaction say the program is geared at "motivating" employees. What someone does to keep fit is entirely up to them.

Fitness: The Facts was evolved out of a need for a low-cost, easy application, practical program. It got its start because large corporations such as CN supported it.

Right now more than 40 Canadian corporations, government departments and public institutions have purchased the Facts for their employees. One of them is a newspaper in Saskatoon. It costs \$6 per person for small companies.

Fitness: The Facts have led large corporations into more intensive programs. Teleglobe for instance, has been subsidizing employee memberships at fitness clubs and Y's.

When you think about it, fitness programs at work are something like a health care benefit package. Fitness is a prevention medicine. Besides, a fitter workforce can mean lower absenteelsm rates, higher moral and as stated, increased productivity.

So how can I get the lead out? What's available in Acton for me to get fit?

The YMCA-YWCA is coming out with their fall programs in a couple of weeks. In it, says President Keith Robbins, there are several fitness programs including ladies' keep fit.

The recreation department last year offered a combined fitness and swim class. And there are organized sports leagues, hockey, baseball, badminton and tennis.

There are some companies in Acton concerned with employee fitness too. Beardmore's has a slow-pitch baseball and bowling leagues. Hellers is in the same ball league while Indusmin employees play ball in Limehouse In-

dustrial. Other large companies in Acton such as Superior Glove or Building Products of Canada have "nothing".

Gary Murn who is a data processing supervisor at Hellers said it was difficult to get any kind of a program while the company is spread out under

three roofs. But he added, once the company is under a single roof, a program such as Fitness: The Facts might be considered. He was already aware of its

existance. Beardmore's felt the same way. But none of the companies had considered incorporating any kind of physical fitness program until I mentioned it. Then there are those who won't consider it.

It was pointed out that workers are probably fit just doing their jobs. Some employees at companies such as Heller's, Beardmore, use physical labor in their work.

But how about sit down jobs? Are office workers, bank employees and reporters doomed to the curse of the spreading bulge?


L & L Ford Mustangs took two in a row against J & T Sports in Acton Ladies
