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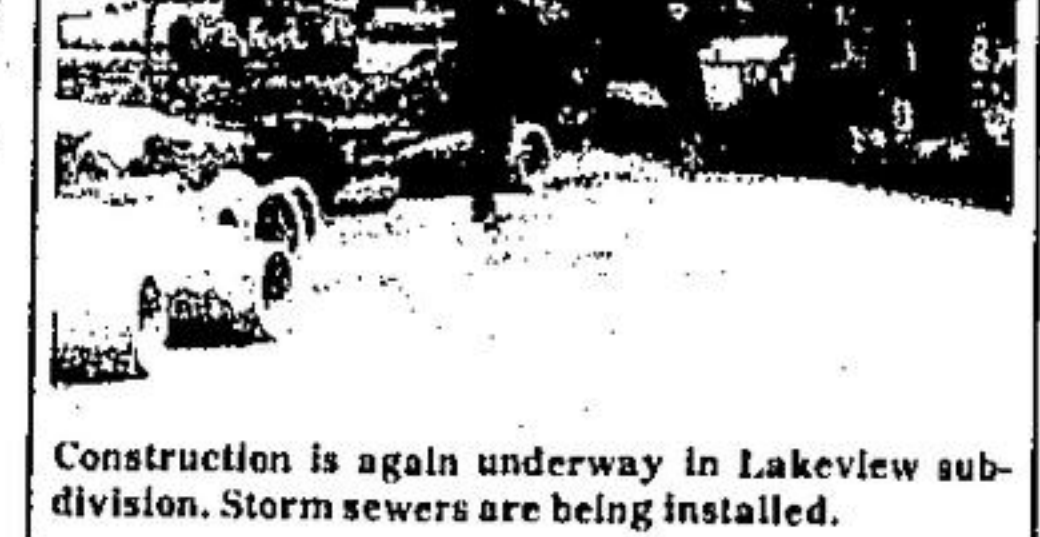
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Construction is again underway in Lakeview subdivision. Storm sewers are being installed.

35 homes Development delayed

A 35 unit housing development on Church Hill Road North in the vicinity of Acton High School is no closer to being approved after being examined again at Halton regional council last Wednesday.

Part of the development is in Esquimes and part in Acton. Cedar Road Development wants the region to change the Esquimes plan so the urban boundary can be adjusted to allow the entire development to be in the urban area.

The issue has been before regional council since last year and was once again referred back to planning committee last week.

Cedar Road Development's lawyer Bert Arnold told councillors they have never understood the region's objections since the changes required are minor.

Planning committee and the region solicitor recommended no changes be made until an Acton urban area servicing review has been completed.

Halton Hills council approved the changes last year after there were no objections from the public.

Arnold said he didn't expect there would be any water and sewer servicing problems since services go to the curling club just north of the development site.

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Dominion 'Mystery Trekkers' visit historic Kingston area

A spirited band of 300 adventurers set forth from points in and around Toronto Saturday morning, bound for Kingston and a "Mystery Trek" filled with scenery, history and good company.

The day-long tour was the third in a series sponsored by Dominion Stores Ltd. Thirty prize winners each brought along nine friends.

Trekkers were outfitted with complimentary travel kits - canvas bags containing brochures and a package of Dominion anniversary cookies.

For guide Mirella Silvaroli, the tour was a welcome break from her usual Saturday duties as a part-time cashier at Dominion's Sherway Gardens store. She will enter her final year in biology at the University of Toronto next month.

911 needed

United States. Then we (Canada) won't have the revenues from Pay-TV to bolster Canadian programming and of course simply be inundated with more American culture.

Olivier rejected the committee's decision that Canadians aren't that anxious to have Pay-TV. Subscribers would find Pay-TV worth the investment just for the money they'd save seeing first run Hollywood motion pictures in their own homes instead of paying \$3 or \$3.50 a head to go to the theatre, he says.

Cable TV isn't in a monopoly situation, people can put up antennas, so the industry needs to offer more programming than people can get with their antennas, Olivier stated.

That means cable TV needs satellite and Pay-TV, Olivier noted. He added costs are going up in the industry but can't be easily passed on to customers so cable TV also needs extra services, like pay TV to sell and raise extra revenue.

Initially C.S.N. programs and stations like CHAN, wouldn't be an extra cost service, but as it grew it might eventually cost extra, Olivier said.

This past winter Halton Cable installed a satellite receiving dish and 300 foot antenna and it has transmitted House of Commons debates, for testing purposes only, with great clarity.

Health and Social Services Committee chairman Walter Mulkevic said he hoped the negotiations could be completed shortly.
