Police don't want 800 gallons of gas

Acting administrator George Moore suggested the commission decide what to do with the regular gas so the tank can be cleaned and filled with unleaded. It is costing approximately an additional 22 cents per gallon at area gas stations, Moore pointed out.

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Deficit doesn't boost petition

Mike Majic, a Waterford resident, is surprised he isn't getting more support from Halton for his campaign to bring down regional government in Ontario after it was discovered this region has a budgetary deficit of over \$700,000. Majic began his one-

man campaign to collect 100,000 signatures protesting regional government in early spring. He expected more support from Halton, especially in Acton where a few years ago 2,000 signatures were collected supporting the town opting out of the region and Halton Hills and from Nassagaweya where there are efforts to separate from Halton and Milton under way.

Majic noted he's collected about 400 signatures from the Acton area, some when he visited here in late May and 180 in a petition sent to him after he brought his campaign here.



Revived interest in the town hall and the cleanup around the building has resulted in some residents asking us what happened to the old bell that sat beside the building. We looked into the matter and found the bell is safe and sound. The cairn it sat on was vandalized so Acton Volunteer Firefighters moved it to the Halton Hills Hydro Commission office where it is safely stored. More than a decade ago the bell, which was used to summon firefighters, was brought down from the town hall tower. Firefighters are looking into ways to have the bell permanently mounted to the fire hall wall.

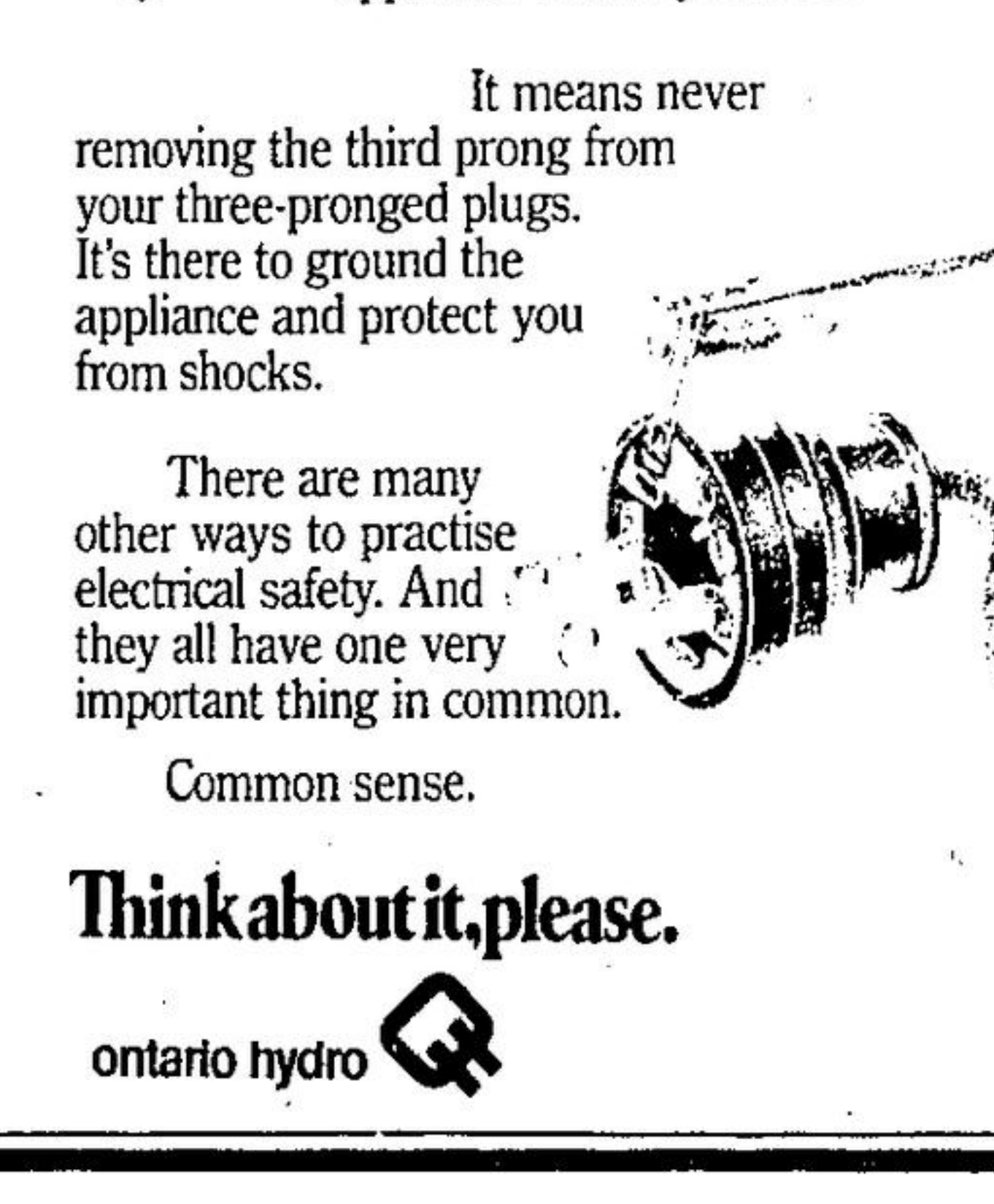
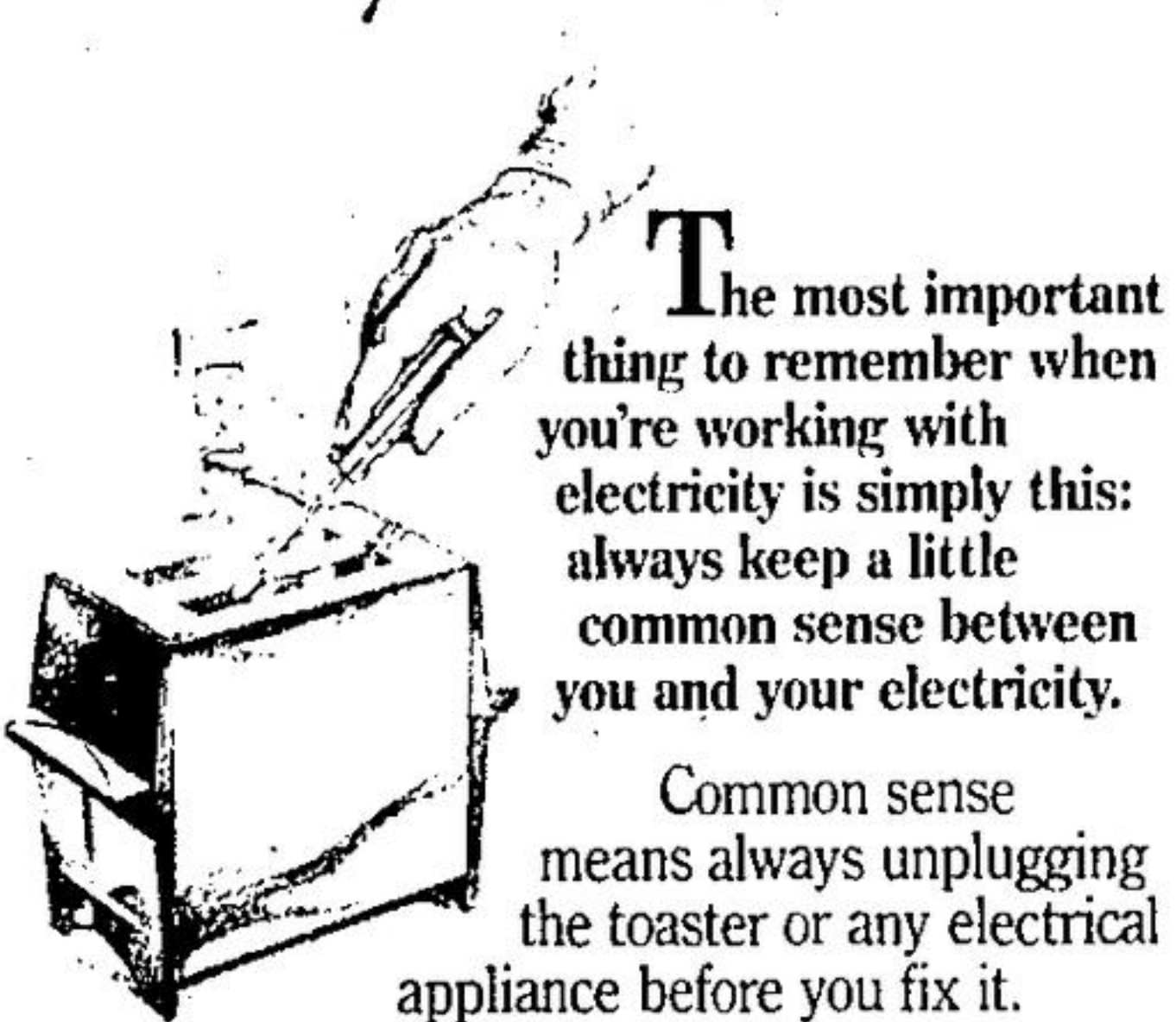
