More offences less accidents

Traffic enforcement figures are up while accident statistics are down during the first six months of 1980, according to Police Chief James Harding.

Comparing the figures with those from January to June 1979, there was an increase of 38.55 per cent in traffic enforcement.

This figure includes criminal code driving offences, provincial statute driving offences major and others and municipal traffic by-laws including traffic tickets.

Accidents decreased by 9.84 per cent however the number of persons injured or killed took a

slight jump. In 1979 seven people were killed in motor vehicle accidents, while this year the fatality total has risen to 10 in the first six months.

"Our increase in enforcement has brought a decrease in accidents and hopefully this will reduce the number of fatalities," Police Chief Harding said.

Police cruiser refit plan works

A plan by the Halton Regional Police Commission to extend the life of the force's cruisers is proving successful, according to police administrator George Moore.

Six vehicles have been refurbished to date, he reported at a meeting of police commissioners Thursday afternoon.

Plans call for a further half dozen 1979 Ford police cars to go through the process.

Police constables using the repaired vehicles are satisfied, he said, adding only one cruiser has been returned to mechanics for repair of a defective motor.

The project was introduced last spring as a means of saving money in the annual purchase of police cars.
