


Rockwood Trail Riders held their annual Trail Horse Trials recently and attracted 44 riders from all over southern Ontario as far away as Niagara and Grimsby.

Held at the Halton Presbytery Grounds, Blue Springs Line, the seven mile trail wound through surrounding bush and farm properties. Eighteen obstacles were set up on the trail and horses were judged at each one receiving marks for their aptitude as a good trail horse. Obstacles ranged from hills, slides, fires and caged a pond where contestants had to ride their mounts into knee deep water dipping a pail of water out of a tethered inner tube.

All horses completed the event billed as "the true test of the trail horse", no untoward incidents happened, and a chicken dinner was enjoyed by all humans.

RTR president Rhonda Rathburn organized the event while Paul Cooper set up trail.

Ribbons and trophles were awarded in addition to several donated prizes. First prize contestants received horse blankets donated by Master Feeds and United Co-operatives; second

By now all Rockwood youngsters are well established in school, kindergarten pupils are over their tears and grade eight students wish Christmas was sooner.

Rockwood Centennial Public School principal Grant McRae says registration is holding approximately the same with 432 students in grades Kindergarten through eight.

Two new teachers are settling in. Miss Cheryl Banks is replacing Mrs. Janet Tapon and is teaching English to her homeroom grade 7 class and French to grades six, seven, and eight. Mrs. Bonnie Whyte is replacing Jack Garland in grade three.

Eramosa Public School reports the same registration of 142 students.


