Obituary

Ozzie Meadows

Well known Rockwood resident and mail carrier or 51 years, Ozzie Meadows died suddenly at his home Monday September 14 in his 73rd year.

Born Oswald Meadows in Rockwood, March 17, 1908 the son of James and Martha Meadows, Mr. Meadows leaves to mourn his wife Jessie; children Vernon of Kitchener, Floyd, Carl and Nancy (Mrs. Tom Rockola) all of Rockwood; grandchildren Lesley and Michelle Rockola, Rob and Carol Meadows; and brother Fred of Rockwood.

Mr. Meadows was predeceased by brothers Howard, Aleck, Emmerson, Cliff, Percy and sisters Carrie, Harriet and Gladys.

Married on April 25, 1931 in Rockwood to the former Jessie Martin, Mr. Meadows spent his life in the village, the last 43 years at 162 Alma Street. He attended Rockwood Public School and for 17 years was school custodian there.

Mr. Meadows was primarily known for his half a century as rural mail carrier for Rockwood routes. At age 21 he took over Route No. 1 from his father who had the route for 22 years before that. He carried mail in horse and buggy, cutter, car and truck. The sight of the green pickup bouncing along side roads has long been a familiar sight to the 160 families on the 22 mile route.

September 1979 marked the fiftieth anniversary of Mr. Meadows' career. He received plaques, awards, and recognition from Her Majesty's government. He was also recognized on his 45th anniversary as a rural mailman.

His quick wit and cheery presence was appreciated by all who knew him.

Funeral service will be held Thursday, September 18 at 2:00 p.m. at Shoemaker Funeral Home, Acton, Rev. C. Doehring officiating.

Interment will be in Rockwood Cemetery.
