



Pete Pomeroy

Mayor seeks second term

Pete Pomeroy will try to keep the mayor's chair for at least the next two years. He announced Monday he would seek re-election in the November 10 municipal election.

Pomeroy was first elected to Halton Hills council in 1976 as councillor for Ward Three, Georgetown, and two years later swept the polls to defeat former Mayor Tom Hill and take top town post.

During his first term, Pomeroy sees the start of the long-delayed library addition and theatre in Georgetown as a major achievement. "It will result in a first rate cultural facility for the town as a whole," he commented.

He said the 1979-80 council took a more aggressive approach to long term planning for rural and urban roads and hopes to continue the program. He noted long term debt had been reduced and taxes increased only slightly, while the level of service had been upgraded, without adding more town staff.

Pomeroy said his first term had been a learning and growing experience which can only benefit the town in the next two years.

The mayor is a Norval resident, and recently sold his sporting goods store in Georgetown.

Bus loading problem reviewed

There won't be a one hour bus loading zone in the River and Willow Streets area.

A bus loading zone for the area was suggested for after school by Robert

Little principal Ron Chatten when he recently attended the ward one councillors' drop-in.

This past Friday veterinarian Dr. Ron Trenton who runs the Halton Hills Veterinary

Services on River Street attended the drop-in to discuss the bus loading zone and possible ban on parking one side of the street.

Councillor Terry

Grubbe revealed that after consulting with engineer Robert Austin the councillors' discovered Chatten's proposal isn't feasible. The engineer said a bus loading zone can't be enforced for just one hour daily and parking can't be banned for just 60 minutes either.

Grubbe noted staff is meeting with Chatten to look for alternatives such as using the Inland Publishing Co. Limited parking lot or school lane for bus loading.

Chatten is concerned about safety after school with five buses loading, children walking away from school and many cars waiting for pupils. Councillor Ross Knechtel said if the town does anything about parking on River Street residents and parents will be consulted first.

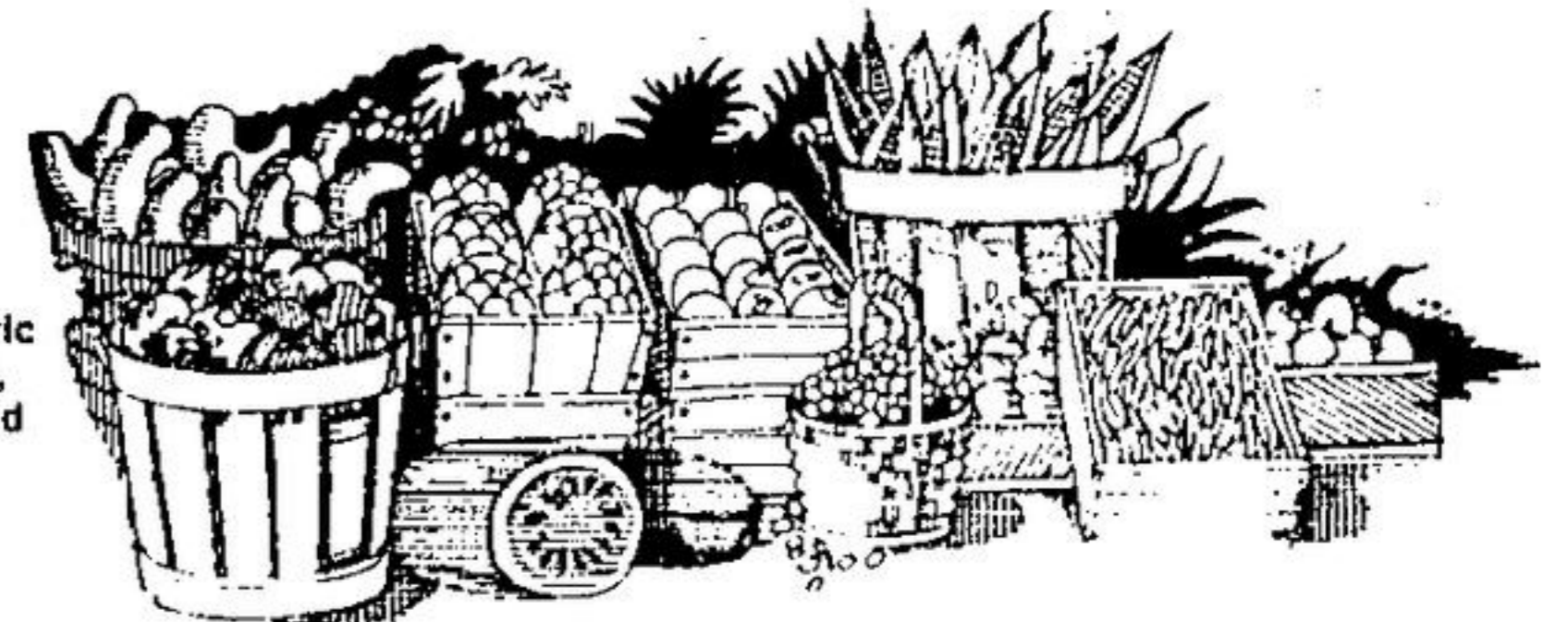
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
