Lisa McGrath crowned by sister

It was a family affair Friday night when Miss Acton Fall Fair 1979 Cathy McGrath passed her crown on to her younger sister Lisa. It was a story book ending to the long evening as 18-year-old Lisa became Miss Acton 1980. It was the first time in the history of the contest a sister succeeded a sister. Lisa was chosen over 14 other girls by judges Julian Reed, MPP for Halton Burlington, Judy Welch, a former Miss Canada and now owner of one of Canada's most top rated modelling agencies, and Gunther Oldenberg, a film producer for the

likes of Walt Disney and 20th Century Fox. Gwyneth Gibb, 17, was first runner-up and Kym Lakin, 16, second. Denise Dilbey and Nancy Vertrieck were also among the five semi-finalists.

The crowning of Lisa and her runners-up was the highlight of an evening's entertainment which saw song and dance routines, unicyclists, and an array of other acts.

Acton's Jack Carpenter was master of ceremonies for the evening with the Ralph Fraser trio providing the backup music for all acts.

Otto Jelinek, MP for Halton, opened the show, with Julian Reed and daughter Melanie leading in 'O' Canada for the fifth

consecutive year. Halton Dairy Princess Catherine Rich and Acton Agricultural Society president Brian Evans welcomed everyone to the fair.

The Beauty Spots with three singers and dancers set the mood for the evening. They were followed by Captain Bill James a magician who used many volunteers from the audience.

Canada's answer to Dolly Parton, Doreen Hayes sang and danced. She had help from well-known Acton resident Bert Davidson for one tune.

The Amazing Arlisses captured the crowd with various juggling, unicycling and acrobatic routines. Fire-eating highlighted the act.

The Fall Brothers kept the crowd of close to 1,000 in stitches with their songs and various stages of undressing.

The Miss Acton contest was interspersed between acts. Spectators got to see the girls in street length clothes and evening gowns before the final judges decisions were announced.
