Mississauga plant to Rockwood. At the meeting he assured councillors the plant has been designed to look like an office building. He told the press the new business would open up 15-20 new

Guelph and Suburban Planning Board secretary-treasurer Roger Truemner commented "the municipality does need some industrial development and this amendment does reflect municipal wishes-it well may be the municipality wants to follow broader thinking in this area."

After noting council's approval of rezoning Truemner explained the application had to go through a variety of steps ending up at the Ministry of Housing for final approval.

Council and the Guelph and Suburban Planning Board are also starting to discuss the ins and outs of rezoning large blocks of land from the Eden Mills corner along the north side of Highway 7 to Crewson's Corners.


