Chase wins biathlon, again

Archie Chase a Georgetown resident and Raider wheeled past the start / finish line Saturday to win th the second annual Acton blathlon for the second time in a row.

Chase shaved minutes off of last year's time to finish the gruelling race in 66 minutes and 21 seconds. Organizer Scott Lee, was right behind

Chase, finishing in 68 minutes and 24 seconds.

Larry Cain came third in 69 minutes and 13 seconds.

The biathlon is a part bicycle, part foot race through the streets of Acton. Twelve competitors from as far away as Montreal and Ottawa lined up at the start / finish line at Lee's Division Street home at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. When the gun went off they bicycled to the curling club, ran up Churchill Road and back, hopped on their bikes, cycled out to Silver Creek, ran part of the Bruce Trail, grabbed a blue or yellow ribbon, ran back, hopped back on their bikes and cycled to the finish line.

Several competitors were Olympic or former Olympic athletes, including Lee who was on the national canoe team during the 1968 and 1972 games.

Penny Werthner-Bales, who is on the national track team and competed in the Montreal games, was the only woman to enter. She finished 10th with a time of 84:27, beating her husband Olympic coach John Bales by a fraction of a second.

This year's biathlon went off without a hitch compared to last year when several competitors got lost. The last crossed the finish line only 19 minutes after the winner.



The Acton Astros captured the Beatrice Youth Challenge Cup for provincial major peewees in a gripping final Saturday in St. Catharines.

The Astros needed more than 30 minutes of overtime play to down Dundas 4-2 and win the provincial Cup.

The Challenge Cup is sponsered by Beatrice Foods for towns with a population of 25,000 and under. Acton's population is about 7,000.

The game was tied 1-1 going into the final minute of play until Mike Hudson, who scored the first goal, popped up again, bagging what appeared to be the winner
