He swims, coaches minor league goalies and has returned to regular school gym classes. Despite long absences, his school grades are excellent. Last term he won two scholastic awards - one for science and one for general academic achievement.

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CRTC notice of decision

Decision CRTC 80-690, Halton Cable Systems Ltd., Georgetown, Acton, Milton, Ont. and surrounding area (800836020)

Pursuant to public notice CRTC 1980-80 dated 4 July 1980, the CRTC announces that it approves the application to amend the cable television broadcasting licence for Halton, Ont. and surrounding area, by adding Environment Canada weather forecast service (XLU-25) to background audio on the community channel.

Decision CRTC 80-611, Halton Cable Systems Ltd., Georgetown, Acton, Milton, Ont. and surrounding area (790095020, 800222001)

Following a public hearing held in Hull, Que. on 25 and 26 June 1980, the CRTC announces that it approves the application for renewal of the cable television broadcasting licence to serve the above-named communities from 1 Oct. 1980 to 30 Sept. 1985, subject to conditions to be specified therein, and for the deletion of reference to specifically enumerated channels in accordance with the Commission's Public Announcement of 4 Dec. 1979.

The licence is subject to the condition that the licensee own and operate, as a minimum, the local head end, the amplifier and the subscriber service drops. Consistent with the Commission's policy not to approve the cable carriage of U.S. FM radio stations engaged in the solicitation of advertising in Canada primarily directed to a Canadian audience, as set out in the Mar. 1979 cable policy review statement, the Commission denies the continued carriage of the signal of WBBN-FM Buffalo, N.Y. The Commission notes the licensee's commitment for continued improvement of resources for the development of community programming.
