Mediator appointed

Board, teachers far apart

A mediator has been named in an effort to resolve contract differences between the Halton Roman Catholic Separate School Board and its 400 teachers.

David Greenspan has been named mediator, by the Ontario Education Relations Commission. He has called the first meeting for this Thursday, Oct. 2 in Burlington.

The board and teachers stand far apart at the moment, although both sides have altered their initial requests and offers. The teachers have been without a contract

since Sept. 1. Teacher negotiators at first asked, last May, for a 23.5 per cent increase over the existing agreement, plus a Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) for a one-year agreement. Their latest request was reduced to

16.3 per cent, without a COLA.

Separate School Board salary negotiations committee chairman Hartley Sherk said the Board's initial offer was 6.7 per cent. Its last offer was increased to 9

Sherk called the teachers' request "ridiculous". He suggested the teachers are looking for a final settlement in the 15 per cent range, but "I don't think the taxpayers think the teachers deserve a 15 per cent increase."

The old contract gave teachers salary ranges of \$10,442 to \$28,847.

Sherk said if the mediator is unsuccessful in getting an agreement, a factfinder will be appointed.




