ordered to pay for damages they have caused. Even when there are no signs prohibiting trespass, entry is prohibited to gardens, orchards, vineyards, land under cultivation, fenced fields and pasture land.

On other types of land, where red markings appear on gates, trees or fences, entry is prothat only certain activities may

be permitted. It is your responsibility to find out what those activities are.

If you enjoy the outdoors, be sure to abide by these new laws. Your co-operation will guarantee that Ontario can continue to provide a wealth of enjoyable rural recreation for us all.




