Registration for the Acton Figure Skating Club continues until October 16.

The club is calling the new season Skate 80 and promises a full program of skating to "ensure an opportunity for each skater to develop skills and work towards badges and Canadian Figure Skating tests," according to the executive.

Skaters at the junior level will be getting 15 minutes of group pro lessons, 30 minutes with coaches and 15 minutes for freestyle. Preschoolers will get 45 minutes of group lessons and practices with coaches.

Skating days will be Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays with Thursday, October 16 the first day of the season.

The 3-5 year olds will begin with the Learn to Skate program. The Junior 'A' and 'B' start with six year olds, who will be working on various badge levels.

The professionals for Skate 80 are Nancy Lovett and Judy Swallow.

Miss Lovett has skated with the Guelph Club for 12 years. Under Lynn and Wilf Pocock, she earned her senior bronze freeskate and gold dance medals.

She was also a member of the Guelph Precision team for three years, during the time they won the North American championship.

Five years of coaching with the Guelph Club and Guelph Parks and Recreation Skate programs gives her working knowledge of all badge levels.

Miss Swallow has 14 years of amateur experience from Toronto. She earned her gold medal in freestyle and junior silver dance. She also has her eighth figure.

She turned pro last season with the Georgetown Club.

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has received an application by the Regional Municipality of Halton for approval of a proposed waste disposal site for land-filling to be located on Part of Lots 6 and 7, Concession VII, New Survey, Geographic Township of Nelson, County of Halton now in the Town of Milton, Regional Municipality of Halton, more particularly in Parts 1 to 5 inclusive, on Plan 20-R-4817 for Registry Division of Halton (20). The proposed site is known as Site "F".
The Environmental Assessment Board will conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it can make recommendations in respect of the proposed waste disposal site. Written and oral submissions may be made to the Board at the hearing. The Board will not consider any submissions regarding the proposal after the hearing has been closed.
The hearing will be held on October 15, 1980, at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, local time, in the Auditorium, Halton Centennial Manor, 185 Ontario Street South, Milton, Ontario.
Plans of the proposed waste disposal site will be available for examination and inspection during normal business hours in the office of the Clerk of the Regional Municipality of Halton, 1151 Bronte Road, Oakville, Ontario, in the office of the Clerk of the Town of Milton, 251 Main Street East, Milton, Ontario, and in the office of the Environmental Assessment Board, 5th Floor, 1 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario M4V 1K7.

To protect the rights of farmers and other property owners, important new legislation has toughened the law against trespass.

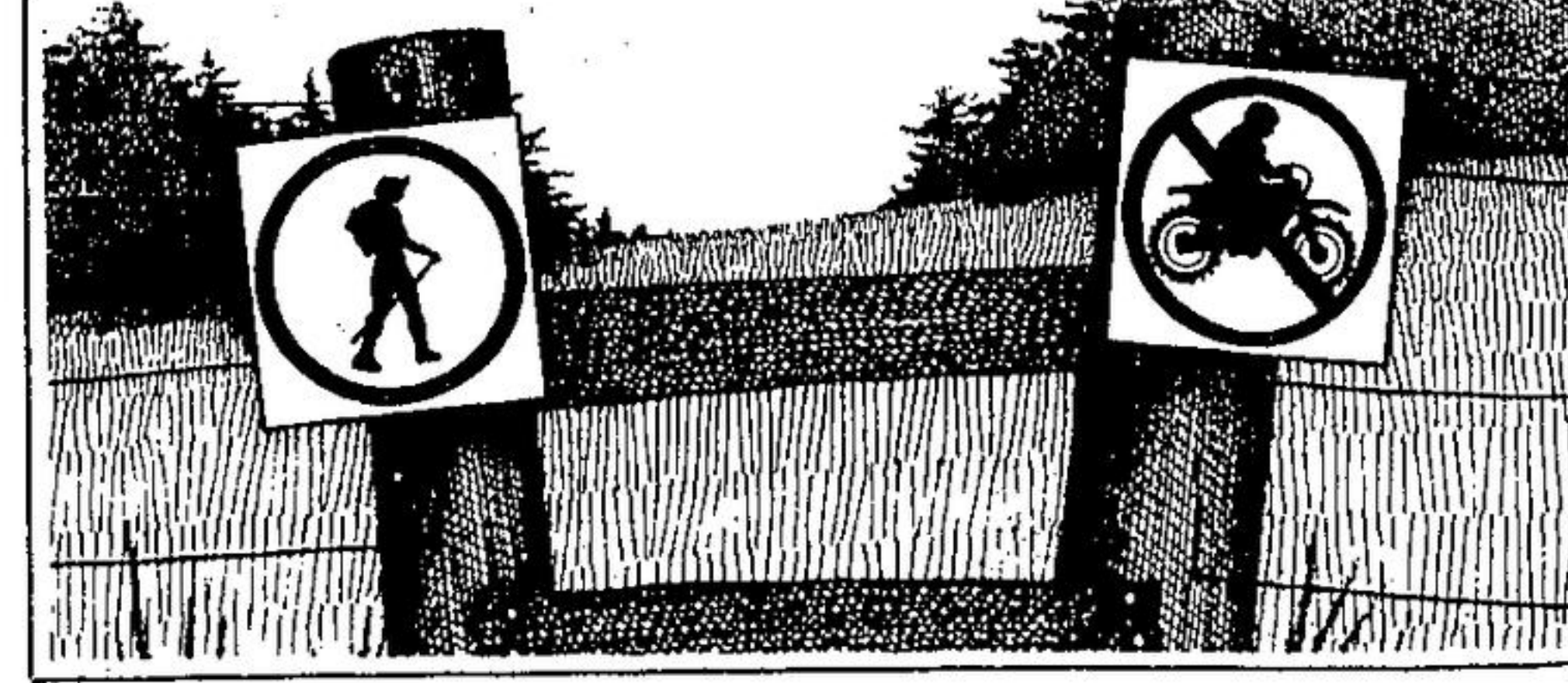
Now trespassers can be fined up to \$1,000 and may also be ordered to pay for damages they have caused. Even when there are no signs prohibiting trespass, entry is prohibited to gardens, orchards, vineyards, land under cultivation, fenced fields and pasture land.

On other types of land, where red markings appear on gates, trees or fences, entry is prohibited. Yellow markings caution that only certain activities may be permitted. It is your responsibility to find out what those activities are.

If you enjoy the outdoors, be sure to abide by these new laws. Your co-operation will guarantee that Ontario can continue to provide a wealth of enjoyable rural recreation for us all.


